Roosevelt's Message Has Little Effect On Markets

NEW YORK, Jan. 4.—President Roosevelt's message to the United States Congress was about as expected in Wall Street and failed to jar markets off dead centre today.

A canvass of Wall Street opinion disclosed that the reaction to the speech was probably slightly favorable on balance.

In some quarters it was felt that those sections of the message dealing with public works carried an intimation of a new program.

On the other hand, the assertion that expenditures would be "within the sound credit of the government" was a source of comfort to those who feared wild spending.

Those parts of the speech which stressed that the "federal Government must and shall quit this business of relief" and cited the desire of the administration not to offer made-work jobs at wages more attractive than private work were hopefully interpreted.

The mention of a return to "sound conditions in the public utilities field" was taken as containing

no fresh scare to the industry while the advocacy of unified control of all phases of transportation and elimination of grade crossings lent some spirit to railroad shares.

Electric issues were the only group to brace up although the rise was slight. Both the railroads and utilities declined but losses were so trifling as to excite little interest.

The Associated Press average of 60 listed stocks was shaded 18 of a point to 40.75. Trading activity was less than yesterday at 965,429 shares, a drop of about 97,000.

A feature of the stock list was the rather brisk demand for preferred issues which scored gains 1 to 7 points.

Included in this group were American Radiator, General Cigar, Johns-Manville, Pacific Telephone, Standard Brands, Sun Oil and U. S. Steel.
