"BIG GUNS" OF LOWLY ROVERS TURNED ON THREE ANCHOR HURLERS FOR 12-4 VICTORY

"Mont" McFarlane and Hobbs Batted From Mound Before Barrage of Hits—Tom McFarlane Used on Slab But Could Not Stem the Tide—"Putty" Connors Pitches Great Ball for Rovers Who Are no Longer in the "Cellar."

By ("TEC") Over fifteen hundred fans witnessed the Rovers climb out of the cellar position in the first section of the City League baseball series at the expense of the Anchors whom they decisively trounced by a score of 12 to 4.

The "north enders" had their batting togs on last evening, and with the assistance of Connors' masterly hurling, especially in tight corners came through the seven innings under wraps with an eight run lead to the good.

Notwithstanding the one-sided score piled up, the game taken as a whole was exciting and with the exception of two bad innings, was good to watch.

A feature of last night's tilt was the cool and collected mound work of Connors who kept the hard hitting Anchors well in hand through out the fixture. On the other hand the west end hurlers were hit freely especially when the bags were loaded.

The second and sixth innings were disastrous for the losers who were forced to watch five runs go over in each, helped along by a flock of hits and not a few errors.

The Game by Innings

First Inning, Rovers—McInnis, first batter grounds to Art McDonald and is thrown out. Melvin Diamond, the "big train" playing his first game of the season is passed by McFarlane. Diamond steals second as Nash strikes out. McEachern, next batter, also gets a free ride as Diamond piffers third. McFarlane pulls himself out of a bad hole by fanning Cullen.

Second Inning, Rovers—Blanchard is safe on an infield hit; Doyle flies to short left field advancing Blanchard. Williams hits to "Dempsey" Diamond and is safe on the latter's error. With the bags full Diamond and Francis hold a consultation with the result that McFarlane is pulled to the mound to replace Hobbs who suffers a setback on a first pitched ball, Connors nailing it at McFarlane who fumbles on the chance allowing Blanchard to score. McInnis lays on a fast one for two bases scoring Doyle; Williams following close on Doyle's heels is nabbed at the plate. The "Big Train" is again passed in preference to Nash the next batter. Hobbs worked nice by fanning him on three straight. McEachern after taking a look over the crowded sacks hits a scorching line drive to centre scoring Connors and McInnis. Cullen follows McEachern with a drive at McDonald on third who fields the ball but throws too low to catch Diamond at the plate. The situation is retired when Blanchard grounds out to Hobbs.

Third Inning, Rovers—Doyle singles to right; Williams out to Hobbs as Doyle goes to second. Connors out to Hobbs. McInnis hits a "Texas Leaguer" to centre scoring Doyle. "Meb" Diamond out to Hobbs.

Anchors—Hobbs flies to Nash who errors on the catch. "Dempsey" get down on passed third strike, but is declared out for interference with the first baseman. The Anchors have a tough break in this inning, when Cronin hits to deep centre and they lose another man on the path, this time Hobbs for interfering with Rovers.
