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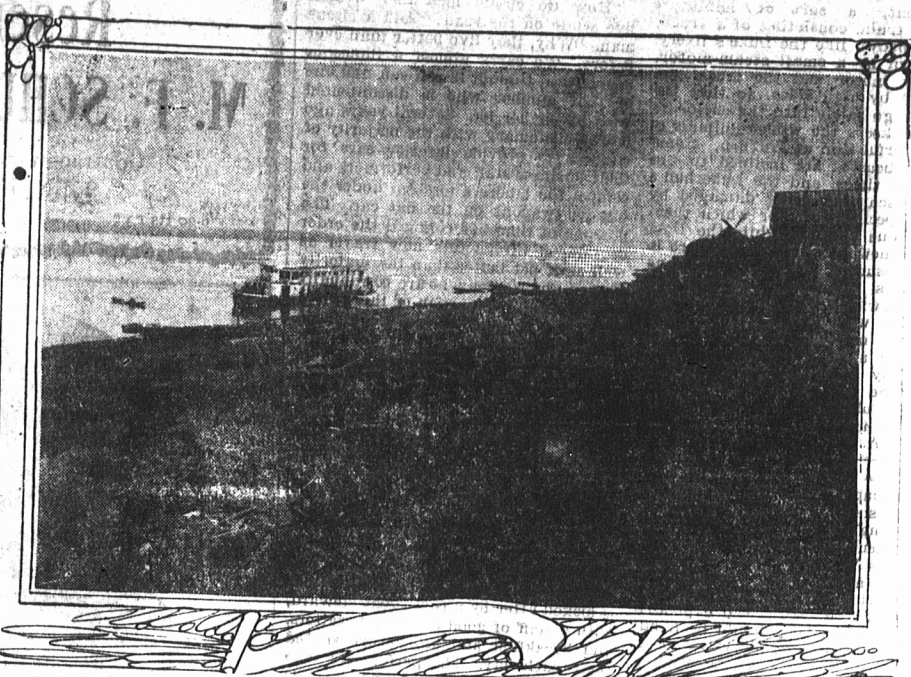

SIR HENRY IRVING.

Approaching Farewell to the Stage—Forty-Eight Years Since He First Set Foot Upon the Boards. At a reception given to him recently by the Manchester Arts Club, Sir Henry Irving made a speech forecasting his retirement from the stage. After thanking his hosts, the guest of the evening referred humorously to the subject of his own age, and proceeded: "The death of plays I scarcely dare to mention, because it provokes lively correspondence in the newspapers. Authors write to say that they have masterpieces in abundance, which the selfishness of actors will not allow to see the light. But every manager is not an actor yearning for the middle of the stage. Mr. Charles Frohman is about as enterprising a manager as you will find; yet, strange to say, he doesn't want to act. But he searches the highways and byways of Britain and America, and I have never heard him complain that he has more masterpieces than he knows what to do with. "I see that an ingenious gentleman has been over to Paris to consult some eminent French experts about the state of the British drama, and the only comfort they could give him was that perhaps it might be better if the Examiner of Plays would permit dramatists a little more freedom in dealing with vital questions of modern life. But to imagine the Examiner licensing an experiment in freedom, on the plea that it dealt with a vital question of modern life, is to suppose a revolution in English taste. I doubt whether this plan, even if it could be adopted, would let loose a native genius for playwriting which is now suppressed by our excessive decorum. But the endowed theatre would certainly give a chance to the untalented author. "In the success or failure of a play there is often an element of mystery. It springs from some unknown quality in the public mind, with which the longest experience cannot reckon. Now the endowed theatre—which need not shut its doors when it is empty—might try a number of plays which the average manager dare not touch. I would suggest, therefore, that the unacted authors should form a league—a league for the cajoling of millionaires so as to raise the capital for that endowed theatre, which even the superfluous wealth of Manchester has not yet established. If only we could find a millionaire who writes plays, the thing would be done. Perhaps he is listening to me now. Out of the fulness of his heart and pocket let him speak, so that the strolling player may pass away from your hospitable board. Oh, he'll come back, I hope—feeling that he has achieved a great work, and feeling more venerable than ever. "Yes, venerable, perhaps, for it is 44 years since I first came amongst you—48 since I first set foot upon it upon me, and never more than at moments like these, when life has so much that is good to leave, that in another couple of years the time will have come when I must say farewell to the art which I have loved all my life. Fifty years of active work as a player is enough; and those years I shall shortly make my last bow to the public, who have shown to me so much love and patience and sympathy; and I shall take with me as I go back from the glare of the footlights a memory which shall be a pride and a pleasure to whatever period of rest may be my lot."

The World Was of India. In the Northern Siam states, on the border of Burma, there is a tribe called the Wild Was. These people propitiate with human skulls the demons whom they worship. Outside every village in their country there are many posts, all in one line, and each with a human skull. A niche is cut in the back of each post, with a ledge on which the skull can rest, and grin through a hole in front of it. Every village has a dozen and some as many as a hundred of these head posts. Fresh skulls are in speckled request at harvest time and are distinguished by large sums, those of distinguished visitors being particularly desired. So, as Mr. Scott, the British Superintendent of the States, remarked some years ago: "The Wa States are, therefore, no place for missionaries or globe trotters."

A Use for the Dandelion. Our old friend the dandelion, for example, which everybody is glad to have dug out of his lawn, although it flourishes where no other bright flower seems able to subsist, furnishes a root of value as a drug. It is a large tap-root, sometimes twenty inches long, thick and fleshy, dull yellow or brownish on the outside, but white inside, practically odorless, and bitter to the taste. It is used in diseases of the liver and in dyspepsia. The best time for digging it is from July to September. It should be thoroughly washed and dried. The drying process decreases considerably its size and weight, and also its medicinal virtues. Hence it must not be kept too long.

Profits of the London Times. A few years ago a lawsuit threw an interesting light on the declaration of The Times that money-making has never been its chief object. In the course of this action it was shown that one-fourteenth of two-thirds of one-ninth of two-sixteenths of a share in The Times was worth less than £20 a year. In 1892 the dividend of this small share was £24; then came the report of the Parnell Commission and in 1893 the dividend fell to £18 10s. and in the following year to £17 3s. 11d. That is to say, in 1892, the profits of The Times were £38,500, and in 1894 only £27,500. Since then the loss has been made up.—London Chronicle.
