WINNERS OF TUBERCULOSIS LEAGUE ESSAY CONTEST — A new and interesting feature of the Public Meeting of the Tuberculosis League to be held, Sunday evening, November 11, at the Prince Edward Theatre, will be the announcement of the winners of the prize essay contest sponsored by the League with the kind cooperation of Dr. H. Mussolini's Dream: A New Roman Empire

The name of Graziani, Mussolini's Governor General of the Italian North African colony of Libya, brings curses to the lips of every Arab. He is in his tent in the Syrian desert or sipping coffee in his bazaars of Tunis or Algiers.

The Arabs everywhere feel undying hate for the man who, to crush their resistance to his tyranny in Libya, took sheikhs of noble birth into the air and threw them from aeroplanes to crash to death against acid tribal hallowers, and who beat others to death.

He, too, it was who—forcibly transporting Libyan Arab tribes by hundreds to desert areas, destroyed the flocks and herds—reducing their camels from 800,000 to 2-600 their ship from 800,000 to 98,000 and their horses from 14,000 to 1,000.

Graziani succeeded as Governor Italo Balbo, whose mysterious death in an air-crash cast suspicion on Graziani.

Balbo was a very different type from the other. He would have done much more to give Italy a real Empire, based on sound methods of development. Mussolini sent him to Libya in order to put him into the shoes of Balbo's exploits in the air had made him the adored hero of the Italian people and a potential rival to the Duce.

Balbo's Colony

Balbo didn't accept his governorship of Libya as exile. He set to work to improve flocks and herds, and he also carried through a great mass-colonization scheme. In 1933 he transported twenty thousand Italian peasants on sixteen steamships from Italy to Libya and settled them in the interior. Within twenty-four hours in eighteen hundred farm houses—all exactly identical with one another, on farms provided with all in seed and animal stock, but also with irrigation from Artesian wells sunk fifteen hundred feet beneath the Libyan sand.

Balbo thus began to create, behind the narrow fringe of fertility on the coast, a new Italy in Africa. His death ended his work, and Graziani began the other sort of Empire-building—the sort that Mussolini prefers—a brutal tyranny.

The Population Problem

But Mussolini still values the mass-colonization idea. His first motive for this is to find space for Italy's swiftly growing population. Her increase is at the rate of 400,000 a year. Mussolini, by financial and other means, incites the Italian people to have more babies, and at the same time, utters curses because there is inadequate room for them on Italian soil.

The Libyan colonization is a step towards the answer, but it is only a small step.

Aiming at Autarky

The second driving force behind Mussolini's imperialism is the Fascist passion for a self-sufficient Italy, or to use the word invented by the Italian Fascists, "autarky." The desire of economic autarky, held over the head of Italy during the Abyssinian crisis, wounded Fascist pride. Italy now plans that Libya shall be a farm of the Roman Empire which, with Abyssinia, would theoretically go some way towards making her independent of imports.

The third motive for colonizing Libya is that of strategic security. Obviously if some hundred thousand sturdy and prolific peasants, owning their own farms in Libya and other territories, were settled on the territory, they would be a sort of Africa immediately opposite to Sicily and the toe of Italy, Italy's strategic position in the Mediterranean is much stronger.

The Mantle of Caesar

The fourth driving force in the Italian adventure of colonization in North Africa is tied up with all the others.

It is the motive that appeals so much to the grandiose imagination of Mussolini, who sleeps every night with the famous book "The Mantle of Caesar" by his bedside; it is the motive of prestige, the passionate desire to make the Mediterranean a new Roman Empire whose frontiers might even go down to the marches of India.

How Rome Would Rule

What the rule of Italy over other races will always be under Fascist rule is officially stated by Benito Mussolini in the Rivista della Colonia (November 1939) in an official expansion of "Italian Colonial Expansion." He says:—

"Our attitude towards the natives will be determined exclusively by the Italian race. It is our duty to Italianize the natives. We shall preserve native institutions as long as they strengthen our productive power in accord with our colonial intentions. We shall rigorously reform native institutions when detrimental to our prestige or security.

"The purpose of native education is to create an obedient, respectful, disciplined population. Intellectuals are available in sufficient numbers in Italy.

"The native, in short, is to remain a subordinate, co-operating with the Italian colonist. He is to remain on the soil to prevent a coloured proletariat from arising."

Hitler Speaks On Big Nazi Anniversary

MUNICH, Nov. 9.—(AP)—Hitler surrounded by Nazis on the eve of the memorial day of the party's rise, said tonight he is confident of German victory.

In observing the anniversary of the unsuccessful beer hall putsch of 1923, he condemned what he claimed were nightly attacks by the Royal Air Force on the German civilian population. German leaders are making "reprisals" he said.

Informed sources said that the Führer, in the Burgerbrau hall where he barely escaped death from a time bomb just a year ago at a similar observance, spoke of the "hard and heavy but beautiful years of struggle."

The last 12 months he viewed as the greatest in German military history. Most of his one-hour speeches was devoted to extolling the "virtues" of the Nazi party and reviewing its strategies and the course of the war. But unlike the open house celebrations observed heretofore, today's meeting was behind closed doors.

"Nor did the Führer carry the speech to the people; they were informed that the text would not be carried until 12:30 p.m. Saturday 10:30 a.m. EST. In the meantime, only a brief summary was made public, and that without direct quotations.

"The British Broadcasting Corporation indicated that the reason Hitler's speech was kept in the airwaves Friday night was because British bombers were over Germany."

The German wireless said Hitler told his followers: "The fight will be continued until we end it by our victory."

The radio said: "Hitler spoke of the inner strength and unity of the nation, of the immense striking power of the German armed forces and of the absolute certainty of the victory of the German people and its leadership."

At the conclusion of the speech, the radio said the party's old guard swore the oath: "We follow the Führer today, tomorrow, all ways, no matter what may come."

Tomorrow, the anniversary of the 1923 putsch which launched the Nazi revolution, is memorial day for those who are in the street today and this year it has been designated as "work day" for Germany.

Clippers Cross Atlantic After Week's Delay

NEW YORK, N.Y. 9.—(AP)—The Atlantic and Dixie Clippers—first living boats to arrive from Europe in a war—due to sail over the Atlantic—launched today with 16 passengers from Lisbon, two from Horta, the Azores, and 20 from Bermuda.

Aboard the Atlantic Clipper was Mallory Minitor, who said there is "absolutely no sign whatever of the British motor being under the German bombardment."

"Actually, from a military point of view," he said, "the bombardment thus far has been troublesome, but not serious."

May Build 12 Cargo Boats In Canada

OTTAWA, Nov. 9.—(CP)—British shipping authorities have before them proposals to construct perhaps 12 cargo ships in Canada. Munitions Minister Howe stated today that the British government is studying the possibility of Canadian yards constructing such ships has called terms to London and is awaiting a reply.

The Minister said it would be possible to build cargo ships in Canada without seriously interfering with the government's building program of corvettes and other warships. Cargo boats would be built in Lower St. Lawrence, Maritime Provinces and Pacific Coast yards. They could not be built in Great Lakes yards because they would be too large to pass through the canals.

Certain adjustments would be necessary by which warships constructed in Great Lakes yards would be expanded so the yards on the coast could turn their attention to cargo ships. The Minister estimated it would require about six months to build a cargo ship.

The Canadian shipbuilding program is well ahead of schedule, the Minister said, and it would be possible to keep ahead even if tide water yards started building cargo ships.

A number of cargo ships were built in Canadian yards before the first Great War. After the Armistice they were operated for some years by the Canadian Government Merchant Marine, but finally were sold to private interests.

Youthful Greek Flier Tells Of Downing Fascists

(By J. Wes Gallagher) (Associated Press Staff Writer)

SALONIKA, Greece, Nov. 9.—(AP)—A 22-year-old Greek aviator credited with shooting down two Italian planes before jumping from his plane today praised his own exploits today to praise a companion who, he said, deliberately crashed into an Italian bomber when his ammunition ran out.

"I hid in a hospital cot and speaking slowly because of a bullet in his lung, Constantine Mitralaxios said he learned later that his companion, Lt. Marlonos, bravely refused to leave the Italian plane, but landed his own damaged craft and captured the Fascist fliers.

Three Greek pursuit ships engaged the Italian bomber, escorted by 12 fighters, and finally drove them off after a desperate 25-minute fight at 15,000 feet above Salonika, four days ago the young flier said.

"Before I was forced to jump," said Lalpropoulou, a dark, handsome chap, "I saw Mitralaxios, who had run out of ammunition, fly his plane into the wing of an Italian bomber, partly wrecking his ship."

"The Italians—four of them—jumped with their parachutes and I later learned that all of them landed in the hills near the city where Mitralaxios landed his ship and captured them."

Efficiency Standard For Worm Powders

The Pest Control Products Act requires that all remedies for worms in animals must be registered in order to be eligible for registration. This standard is based on investigations and tests by the leading authorities on the treatment of animals for worms. The Department of Agriculture, it was proved conclusively that those remedies which contain anthelmintic drugs—that is, drugs capable of expelling or destroying intestinal worms—are effective and that those drugs which do not contain anthelmintic drugs are ineffective as eliminators of intestinal parasites from animals, but often suitably modified.

Says Democracies Must Never Be Blind To Facts

NEW YORK, Nov. 10.—The Democracies must never again allow themselves to be the victims of fact-blindness, Hendrik Willem van Loon, noted author and historian, said tonight. Citizens of the democracies must be trained to keep their minds open.

"This time we were almost caught napping," he said, "but in many instances where Nazi plans for conquest became known but went unheeded."

"This time we almost perished because we were struck with a deplorable case of fact-blindness. Let us watch that we never learn in the future calamity almost overtakes us, because, having eyes, we yet failed to see and having ears, we yet failed to hear."

"The same time the distinguished scholar from the Netherlands expressed no doubt about the ultimate victory of the cause of human freedom."

Mr. van Loon spoke from New York at the invitation of G. C. Smith, director of the Public Information at Ottawa, in the weekly series, "Let's Face the Facts," broadcast over a national network of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation.

"We have got to train our young generations the way we train our old ones," he said, "and we must train them to judge every case on its own merits, train them never to take anything for granted," he said.

Says National Unity Growing In Canada

OTTAWA, Nov. 9.—(CP)—Since Canada entered the war, national unity has steadily strengthened and Canada is in its war effort, Brooke Claxton, Lib. Montreal-St. Lawrence-St. George's declared today in the House of Commons, as he moved the address in reply to the Speech from the Throne.

French Canada yielded place to no one in its loyalty to the Dominion, he asserted. Of the 21 members of parliament in military service, seven were French-Canadians from Quebec.

"Some people in Canada voice a kind of loyalty which by definition no Canadian or non-British subject can share," he warned. "In being more British than the English they tend to drive Canadians of other origins sometimes back to their own countries, sometimes to a local loyalty."

"The common ground on which all Canadians can meet is a common loyalty to Canada."
