**FILMS FOR RECRUITING**

LONDON, January 24—Now that the British army authorities have at length realized the uses of advertising, they evidently intend to take the fullest advantage of it in its most modern forms.

An advertising campaign began this week with full-page advertisements in the daily newspapers, setting forth the attractions of military service. This will be followed next week with the presentation of films at the leading London theaters, intended to rouse ardor among London's youth.

Twenty-five thousand troops posed in the preparation of the pictures, which depict in an alluring manner every-day scenes in the great centers. Later on films will be shown in promising recruiting districts in the provinces, and while the performance is proceeding bands will parade in the neighborhood, seductive posters will be conspicuous on billboards, and recruiting agents will be called upon to exercise their persuasive powers.

**\$1,000,000 INVOLVED IN THIS WILL CASE**

TORONTO, January 24—The McVicar case, in which the will of the late G. A. McVicar, of Port Arthur, is attacked, was before the master in chambers at Osgoode hall this morning in the shape of an application to enlarge the period for producing the evidence of Mrs. Goldsmith, McVicar's housekeeper.

Those attacking the will say Mrs. Goldsmith is their only witness, Mrs. Goldsmith's physician having died. Mrs. Goldsmith has recently given birth to a child, hence the reason for extending the time to March first. The amount of \$1,000,000 is involved in this suit.

**Practical Fashion Hints**

No. 8051 is a new and attractive one-piece dress with a drop-shoulder, an unusual collar, a full length sleeve, which may also be made in elbow length, a shaped girdle and two useful patch pockets, one on each side of the skirt. These pockets may be omitted if they are not fancied.

This frock may be made up attractively in almost any suitable material. Wool sponge and serge are extremely practical for general or business wear and a rather smart little afternoon costume may be evolved by using fustian or one of the other soft silks or silk poplins.

The following device for marking both sides of the material (where it is cut, double) I have found very useful. It is called "thread marking" and is employed by many tailors and gowns makers:

Take a piece of sharpened tailor's chalk and while the pattern is still on the material mark the seam allowance, tucks, plaits, etc.; remove the pattern and with a double basting thread take straight, or double bastings stitches about a quarter of an inch apart along the dotted chalk line. Do not draw your stitches tight, but rather let them be loose enough for each stitch to form a small loop or arch; carefully draw the material apart to the full extent of the stitches and cut the line of stitches exactly in two between the two pieces of goods. This leaves a line of cut stitches on each piece of goods, marking both sides exactly alike.

This dress may be made in size 36 with 4 1/2 yards of 36 inch material. The pattern is cut in 5 sizes; 34 to 42.

**DEFIANT OUTLAW NOW MILD MANNERED**

MAYVILLE, January 23—Edward Beardsley, the defiant outlaw of Thursday is now a meek, mild-mannered little man behind the bars in the county jail here, and the farm house on the hill near Summerdale, in which he held out for eight days against Sheriff Anderson and his deputies, is untenanted.

Beardsley was arrested on a charge of assault with intent to kill. Postmaster John Putnam, the victim of the shooting affair, is well on the road to recovery.

Yesterday afternoon two large sleds were driven up to Beardsley's home. The nine children and Grandma Austin were bundled into one and driven to Mayville.

The second sleigh took Mrs. Edna Pier to the hospital. She is a sister to Edith Austin, whom Beardsley calls his wife, and the mother of five of the nine children in the Beardsley household. Mrs. Pier is suffering from a severe, but not necessarily dangerous wound in the leg, the result of the accidental discharge of a revolver on Sunday evening.

Beardsley's so-called capture occurred at four o'clock Thursday morning. He had previously agreed to go into Mayville with his captor, Charles D. Backus, a hotel man. He wanted to defy Sheriff Anderson to the end, he said.

Backus drove to the house, unaccompanied, and called Beardsley to the window. He came, unarmed. He demurred at first, saying he feared the deputies would fire on him. Backus grabbed him by the arm and told him there would be no backing down. Beardsley wilted. He allowed Backus to come into the house and gather up his ammunition.

**LOCK OF LINCOLN'S HAIR BROUGHT \$330 AT SALE**

NEW YORK, Jan. 26.—C. Hines paid \$330 for a lock of President Lincoln's hair cut from around that bullet wound the night he was assassinated. The purchase was made at the closing sale of Lincoln memorabilia from the library of the late Major William H. Lambert, of Philadelphia, at the Anderson Galleries, Madison avenue and Fortieth street.

The lock had been retained by Dr. Charles S. C. Taft, one of the attending surgeons. Dr. Taft's son sold it in 1908 for \$600 to Major Lambert, who had a gold box made for it.

Cut buttons worn by President Lincoln the night of the assassination were sold for \$150; the inkstand he used in his office in Springfield, Ill., for years brought \$505, his office chair \$265 and a cane he carried and battered at \$435. The manuscript of the lecture on "The Death of Lincoln," delivered by Walt Whitman in the Madison Square Theatre, this city, brought \$120.

In the library were 1,028 items, which sold for \$2,439.10. The remainder of the library, consisting of memorabilia of Thackeray, will be sold at auction about a month hence.

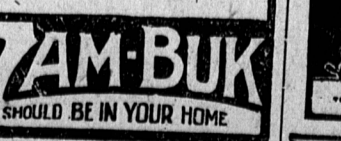
