The words of the follow- ing hymn have been sung through many generations and in many lands. They acquire a new signifi- cance as they call to mind the trials and privations of those heroic men and women who, in deep forest or lonely clearing, made the first Canadian homes. Leaving behind many of their own kin and friends and the securities and comforts of civilization, they brought with them a high courage, arms endurance, and an abiding faith in the God of their fathers.

Then shall be sung by all present. No. 2. O God of Bethel! by whose hand Thy people still are fed; Who through this weary pilgrim- age Hast all our fathers led: Our vows, our prayers, we now present Before Thy throne of grace; God of our fathers; be the God Of their succeeding race.

Through each perplexing path of life Our wandering footsteps guide; Give us each day our daily bread, And raiment fit provide. O spread Thy covering wings around, Till all our wanderings cease, And at our Father's loved abode Our souls arrive in peace. Amen.

Then shall be read aloud by all present. PSALM C. No. 3. O be joyful in the Lord all ye lands; Serve the Lord with gladness and come before His presence with a song. Be ye sure that the Lord He is God; It is He that hath made us, and not we ourselves; We are His people, and the sheep of His pasture.

O go your way into His gates with thanksgiving and into His Courts with praise: Be thankful unto Him, and speak good of His name, His mercy is everlasting; And His truth endureth from gener- ation to generation.

To be read by the person presiding. The text of the Lord's Prayer as here set forth is as used at the opening of each day's proceedings in the Parliament of Canada by the Speaker of the Commons and the Speaker of the Senate.

Then shall be said by all present. No. 4. Our Father which art in Heaven, Hallowed be Thy name. Thy King- dom come. Thy will be done in Earth, as it is in Heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive them that trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation; but deliver us from evil.—Amen.

Proudly you gathered, rank on rank to war, As who had heard God's message from afar; All you had hoped for, all you had, you gave To save Mankind—yourselves you scorned to save.

Splendid you passed, the great sur- render made, Into the light that nevermore shall fade; Deep your contentment in that blest abode, Who wait the last clear trumpet- call of God. Amen.

A land of wheat, and barley and vines, and fig trees, and pomegranates; a land of oil, olive and honey; A land wherein thou shalt eat bread without scarceness, thou shalt not lack anything in it; a land whose stones are iron, and out of whose hills thou mayest dig brass; When thou hast eaten and art full, then thou shalt bless the Lord thy God for the good land which He hath given thee.

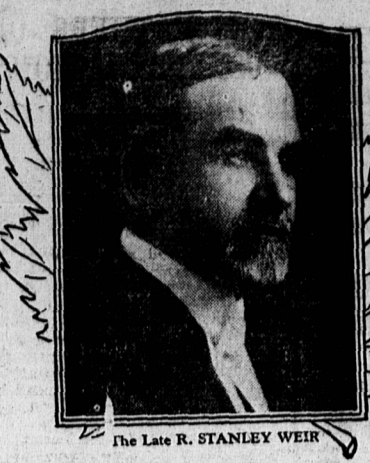

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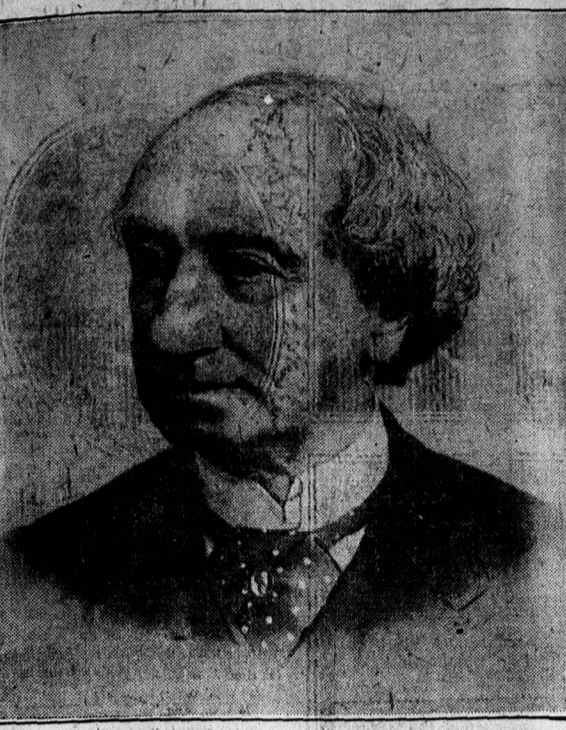

Replies were received that the version written by the late R. Stanley Weir, D.C.L., Recorder of Montreal, is being used in the schools of all the Provinces, including the English-speaking sections of Quebec. In view of this, the Committee is using the Weir version in its own publications.

First Draft of Confederation Pact

Facsimile of portion of Sir John A. Macdonald's first rough draft of the British North America Act.

Be it therefore enacted &c
It shall be lawful for Her Majesty with the advice of Her Privy Council to declare, (or to authorize the Governor General of British North America to declare) by Proclamation that the said Provinces of Canada, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick upon from and after a certain day in such Proclamations to be appointed, which day shall be written in the said Proclamation, shall be united into one Kingdom under the name of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, and after the day so appointed as aforesaid.
The Executive Government of the said Kingdom shall be vested in Her Majesty the Queen her Heirs and Successors
