### Social Glamor Reaching Peak In Old London

Metropolis Livened With Big Affairs, Lipstick Stirs Women's Army, Leader Duties Divided

LONDON, Dec. 8.—(CP)—Fashion and glory of royal entertainments in Britain is having far-reaching effects. Not since State visits of pre-war days has national hospitality been so magnificent on so magnificent a scale, and not since the evening before the war have women appeared so spectacularly jewelled and so beautifully gowned in moderation.

The peak of the recent entertainments for visiting royalties was reached perhaps on the night of a State dinner given by King Carol at the Rumanian Legation followed by the less formal reception at Buckingham Palace. On that evening both the Queen and the Duchess of Gloucester wore grey satin gowns that shimmered as if of silver and were of the billowing crinoline type with off-the-shoulder bodices.

The papers commented on the styles next day and published photographs and within three days every fashion editor in town had sketches and photographs of "the return of the crinoline" as full page features, welcoming it as the first radical change in evening fashions since the severe silhouette came in style.

Yet as if to offset this trend the "smart Duchesses" of Kent has clung to the more conservative empire lines though a few weeks ago she astonished society by appearing in a black fur-skirted evening gown on several occasions.

Those who know or pretend to know all the reasons that lie back of such royal decisions say that the crinoline might interfere with the activities of a vice-chairman of the Health and Beauty girls. Her work is now being delegated to others. Peggy St. Lo, one of the most active of the teachers will take over the production work. Mrs. Alexander Cruickshank, aunt of Lady Douglas-Hamilton, will work with leaders from various branches all over the world in organizing the League into what she terms a "Greater Democracy instead of a more or less dictatorialism."

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### Prepare For Opening Of Parliament

OTTAWA, Dec. 8.—(CP)—Cabinet Council is faced with a heavy program of work entailing not only preparations for the session of parliament opening Jan. 12 but arrangements for the reception to the King and Queen next May, and a long list of appointments probably involving cabinet changes, but today's meeting of the Government did not bring any announcements.

When early this week Prime Minister MacKenzie King arranged for today's meeting of the Government, Wednesday and Thursday, he told reporters the main object was to prepare legislation for Parliament so long as the Government measures would contribute to a long session.

It is the hope of the Government that the session of Parliament will be completed in time for the arrival of the King and Queen next May, and that Government legislation will be presented early.

Next week, however, is expected to bring action on the appointments to three legations abroad, seven senatorial seats, and the Chief Justiceship of Ontario. The Prime Minister's meeting of the Government has planned to have these vacancies filled before Christmas.

It is generally expected that Col. W. J. A. Mackenzie King will be appointed to the portfolio of Postmaster-General, succeeding Hon. J. C. Elliott, who is believed to have resigned the Senate. Mr. Elliott may hold his seat until the general election thus avoiding the necessity of a by-election.
