Fire Damages Miscouche House

A fire of unknown origin considerably damaged the home of Mr. Linus Lecky, Miscouche, early Tuesday morning and but for good fortune might have destroyed it and threatened the lives of the occupants.
Lecky's sister, Miss Eileen Lecky, was awakened by smoke and the crackling of flames about three o'clock in the morning to find fire burning beneath the floor of her bedroom.
She quickly awakened her brother who summoned help from among the neighbors and with the aid of buckets of water were able to quench the flames.
There was considerable damage to two rooms down stairs and to the joists between the two floors. Cause of the fire is a mystery as it was not in the vicinity of a stove pipe. - S

Aged Woman Dies of Burns

Mrs. Samuel Frizzell, aged 82 years of Springfield West, died early Tuesday morning in the Western Hospital, Alberton, as the result of burns received in her home on Friday morning.
Mrs. Frizzell, whose husband is ill and confined to his bed, was burned when she dropped a match on her clothing which she was using to light an oil lamp. Some kerosene had previously been spilled on her clothing and it ignited and she immediately became a mass of flames.
The only others in the house beside her bedfast husband, were her two young grandsons, Delmar and Golding, who managed to beat out the flames. Dr. L. G. Dewar was immediately summoned from O'Leary, five miles away who after treating her, rushed her to the hospital.
It was found that Mrs. Frizzell had received serious burns about the body, one leg, an arm and hand, and also her face and neck.
The shock, at her advanced years proved too much and she died at five o'clock on Tuesday morning.
There are left to mourn besides her husband, two sons, Stirling and Andrew, living in Springfield West and a daughter, Eleanor, Mrs. Beecher Graham in Rose Valley. She was a native of Emsdale, the former Christina Murray. She was the last surviving member of a large family.
The funeral will take place from her late home, Springfield West today, Thursday at 2 p.m.-S.

Expect Cut-Over To Dial Phones In S'ide This Month

The actual date of the cut-over to dial telephone service in Summerside should be completed in about ten days time it was learned yesterday.
During the past three days a conference of a coordinating committee of head technicians has been under way at the Summerside office and final tests are now under way.
Yesterday dial tests commenced for individual subscribers. This is done by testing every phone individually and then making sure that one person in every household knows how to operate the dial. This will take about three weeks to complete. The traveling instructor, Miss Jean Blackwood of Halifax, is now here teaching the local operators to operate the new toll board.
