British sink Italian sub

LONDON, March 9—(CP)—The British Admiralty announced yesterday the Italian submarine Anfritrivo which attempted to attack a British convoy in the Aegean Sea March 6 had been sunk.

The Anfritrivo, built in 1933, was of 590 tons. She carried a normal complement of 41 men, six 21-inch torpedo tubes and one 3.5-inch gun.

(The Italians, in a communiqué, said today they had lost a "warship of medium tonnage from an undetermined cause" in the Mediterranean.)

Canadiens lose 8-0 to Bruins

BOSTON, March 9—(CP)—Boston's high-powered Bruins gave Paul Bibeault, the National Hockey League's newest goalie, a blistering welcome tonight when they overwhelmed Montreal Canadiens 8-0 before a crowd of 10,000 here.

While the Bruins were fattening their individual scoring averages, they gave their own goalie, Frankie Bruesek, such air-tight support that he chalked up his sixth shut-out of the season in easy fashion.

The win lifted the Bruins back into sole possession of first place ahead of Toronto Maple Leafs who dropped an 8-5 decision to New York Rangers.

Bobby Bauer and Art Jackson each registered twice during the one-sided contest, and Bill Cowley, the League's leading point-maker, extended his total to 55 by contributing three assists, thereby extending his new league record for successful play-making to the 41 mark.

Captain Dit Clapper had an outstanding night too, scoring one and assisting in two other counters. The other Bruins to beat Bibeault were Roy Conacher, F. H. Hollett and Herb Cahan.

Mowers blanks Canadiens 4-0

MONTREAL, March 9—(CP)—Rookie Johnny Mowers, the man who made the difference for Detroit Red Wings, turned in the fourth shut-out of his initial National Hockey League season here Saturday night as the Wings defeated Montreal Canadiens, 4-0, to all but clinch third place for the Stanley Cup playoffs.

The result left the idle New York Rangers with only a slim chance of edging Detroit out for third position—the berth that gives all the breaks of home ice in the lower playoff rounds. With two games to play, the Rangers must win them both while Detroit are looking their remaining three to pass the Wings.

First period counters by Mud Bruneteau and Syd Howe gave Detroit a 2-0 edge, which they increased on breakaway goals by Giesbrecht and Alex M. tier in the final frame.

NEW YORK, March 9—(CP)—The New York Rangers tonight defeated Toronto Maple Leafs 8-5 in a fast, exciting National Hockey League game that was in doubt until the last 2-1-2 minutes when wingman Lynn Patrick fired home a pair of goals to give Rangers an unbeatable lead.

The Leafs who fought back courageously from a 4-1 deficit half way through the second period had worked the score to 6-5 and threatened to tie it up when the elder Patrick got on the scoring end of two three-man rushes.

Defeat for the visitors cost them their share of first place as Boston Bruins, who were tied with them, won a home game from Canadiens. The total of eight goals against him cost Turk Broda his lead in the Vezina Trophy race for lowest goals against a goal tender. Broda, who had an apparently unbeatable lead of 11 goals last Tuesday now is one goal in arrears to the Detroit youngster, Johnny Mowers. Coach Happy Day shifted Nick Metz to centre between Gordie Drillon and Red Heron and the changed line was good for three goals, Drillon getting two and Metz one. Dave Schirner and Billy Taylor got the others.

Drillon gets 100th goal as Leafs win 6-1

TORONTO, March 9—(CP)—Gordie Drillon, the big boy from Moncton who has slapped so many pucks that at times he plays as though he was tired of looking at them, today displayed one of the rubber discs as a prized souvenir. It was the puck which he scored his 100th goal of regular National Hockey League play as he helped Toronto Maple Leafs smother New York Americans 6-1 here Saturday night.

A hero with the fans one night and a bum the next because of his easy-going style, Drillon has been with the Leafs five seasons. His goal—19th of the current campaign—came late in the third period after the Leafs had already scored five times. He deflected a pass from Red Heron and clinched any chance of the puck seeing another faceoff by diving into the New York net to retrieve it.

Drillon's effort clinched the lopsided victory which moved the Leafs into a first-place tie with the idle Boston Bruins and removed the last mathematical hope the tail-end Amerks had of making the playoffs.

Records smashed At K. of C. games

NEW YORK, March 9—(AP)—Three world records were smashed and one tied and big John Borican scored a double at 650 and 1,000 yards Saturday night as 15,000 fans saw the windup of Madison Square Garden's indoor track program in the annual Knights of Columbus Games.

All Borican in the shot-put, Earle Meadows in the pole vault and Borican in the shorter of his two triumphs contributed the world records. Fred Wolcott, the hurdler, equalled another.

Having been robbed of a record a week ago through a technicality, Blozis made his bid for a new world indoor mark in the shot-put, official by leaving the 16-pound ball 88 feet 2 7/8 inches. The former indoor mark, his own, was 55 feet 8 inches.

Wolcott, who smashed three world records in earlier meets this winter, remained unbeaten for the season as he took the 60-yard hurdles in 7.3, tying the meet record. In his first heat he had tied the world record of 7.2.

Borican won the Casey 600 by 12 yards in one minute 10.2 seconds, six tenths of a second under the mark Jimmy Herbert of New York set in this meet last year.

Meadows made a pole vault of 16 feet 7 1/8 inches to top his own 14 feet 6 7/8 inch performance in Boston this winter.

ROYALS EVEN SERIES
