The War This Week

A withdrawal of the Greek and British armies from the hills ruling westward from Mount Olympus to a line barring the approaches to Attica appeared to be developing as the 8th week of the war drew to a close.

A Greek spokesman's statement that "uneasiness and regret regarding the military situation are justified" and a British announcement that the front is being shortened would indicate that the Allied forces, in their present positions, are unable to withstand the pressure of German forces thrown into the attack in overwhelming numbers without regard to losses.

Behind the present British front lie the plains of Thessaly, particularly vulnerable to the enemy's numerical superiority in tanks. Accordingly the withdrawal is likely to continue until hilly country is again reached, and a line running from Thermopylae in the east to the gulf of Patras in the west would appear to be the probable front.

Such a line, if held, would safeguard Athens, and keep the Peloponnese and the Greek islands, so well adapted to amphibious warfare, in Allied hands. Its tenability would be governed to a large extent by the ability of the Royal Air Force to achieve superiority in the air from its bases in southern Greece and Crete.

Yugoslavia appeared to have been fully subdued after two weeks' fighting, leaving guerrilla fighters in the hills and non-co-operation by the civilian population as the best the Allies can expect from the Serbs from now on. The whereabouts of the Yugoslav government remained known only to Allied governments.

The rapid German push across Libya and into the western desert of Egypt spent its initial force at Salum and found itself harassed by British desert fighters, by bombardment from the sea and air, and from the rear by the British garrison at Tobruk, which the main Axis forces by-passed in their haste to reach Egypt. However, it is unlikely the German commander will be content to take things as easy as did Marshal Graziani before he was chased out by the Army of the Nile.
