The Legislature of the Dominion Elections Come On

Then go to the Country on Prohibition—North Oxford Election Jan. 26—Self-styled Prince Arrested for Debt.

THE TRANSFORMATION COMMISSION St. John, Jan 8 (Special)—The Transportation Commissioners have arrived here and will begin their sittings Saturday morning.

PREMIER ROSS' INTENTIONS. TORONTO, Jan. 8 (Special)—It is believed that Premier Ross will adjourn the Provincial House if the Dominion elections are called on.

A POLICY OF PROHIBITION. It is also said the session will be shortened as much as possible and an appeal to the people then taken on the temperance question.

THE NORTH OXFORD ELECTION. The election in North Oxford will be held on Jan. 26.

This is the seat held by the late Mr. Pattullo, Liberal who had 1000 majority at the general election of 1902. It was formerly Sir. Oliver Mowat's constituency.

Liberal Majority Doubled in Ashburton Division

Russian Christmas Passed Without Anti-Jewish Riot—A Horrible Murder and Suicide in Minneapolis.

NO RIOT AT KISHINEFF. St. Petersburg, Jan. 8 (Special)—There is no news here of rioting at Kishineff and the Russian Christmas is believed to have passed off quietly.

VERDICT AGAINST CHAMBERLAIN. LONDON, Jan. 8 (Special)—H. T. Eue, Liberal, was elected today for Ashburton Division of Devonshire, succeeding a Liberal, but with double the majority of the late member.

THE HOCKEY SEASON OPENED-- GOOD GAMES AT HILLSBORO RINK

The hockey season was successfully ushered in at Hillsborough Rink last night, when in the first senior game of the League series the Abegweits defeated the Victorias seven goals to four. That the game is increasing in popularity was evident from the large crowd of spectators who almost completely filled the rink. The managers are apparently determined that if the game decreases in popularity they will not be responsible, and they with the players are certainly to be commended for their promptness in starting last night's game. Late starts have always been annoying, but last night there was no cause for grumbling; the game was promised at 8:10; the desires of hockey lovers were recognized and sharp on time Referee Baker lined up the teams. It was hoped that future games will not be exceptions to last night's rule.

The result of the game was a surprise. At the outset the Victorias showed superiority in forward work and in less than five minutes scored two goals. They could not stand the pace however, and the Abegweits as usual proved the better fishers. The first half ended with two goals to the credit of each team. In the second half the Victorias again scored two; the Abegweits placed five goals to their credit and the game ended Abegweits seven, Victorias four.

The game was a good exhibition for an "opener" and augurs well for good play in the remaining matches. At times the play was as fast as has been seen in past league games; but occasionally there was

monotonous "lifting" competitions between the defence men. The Abegweits defence was superior to their opponents and their checking was effective. In the second half the Abegweits forwards also were superior and showed much better form. Both teams could with profit attempt more combination work.

The Intermediate game was won by the Victorias with a score of 6 to 3.

THE SITUATION IS VERY GRAVE

Baron Hayashi Says He Has Little Hope of Peace

But war is not yet—Britain's Fleets in Motion—Ten Per Cent War Risks—Japs Hurrying Home.

SIGNIFICANT FLEET MOVEMENTS.

LONDON, Jan. 8 (Special)—The British home fleet left Portland today for the Spanish coast to be in readiness to replace the Channel Squadron in the event of the latter being required to fill vacancies in the Mediterranean Squadron should its vessels be ordered to the Far East.

LITTLE HOPE OF PEACE.

The Japanese Minister Baron Hayashi, admits that conditions in the East are very grave and he has little hopes of peace.

DIPLOMACY NEAR ITS LAST WORD.

He said the Russian reply to Japan is utterly opposed to the main Japanese contentions, but that diplomacy has not yet said its last word.

WAR RISKS ON SHIPS.

Lloyds today ordered special war rates of ten per cent on all Russian and Japanese vessels leaving Pacific ports.
