SHIPPING AT PEAK AS HUDSON BAY ROUTE OPENS CHURCHILL, Man., Aug. 26—The steamer "Whitshell" Park discharged a varied cargo here this week as the Hudson Bay route shipping season neared its peak in the first post-war year. On board she carried 600 cases of liquor for Winnipeg, 600 cases for Regina, 43 cases of curing rocks consigned to Flinton, Man., several shipments of china for stores in Winnipeg, Calgary and Moosejaw, a case of cycles for the Saskatoon Cooperative Society, several shipments of stationery for Western Canadian points and a model of the steamship "Penny Worth".
