WEDDING BELLS AT NORTH RIVER.—On Wednesday evening, Sept 26th, the North River Baptist Church was the scene of an event which although anything but unusual is of a character that never loses its attractiveness, the contracting parties being Hugh A. McLean of Montague, the well known gospel soloist and Miss Linnie Stevenson, eldest daughter of Mr. John Stevenson of North River, who for years has faithfully served the church as organist and choir leader. The wide acquaintance and popularity of the principals in this event give it a special interest. As a singer of the gospel, Mr. McLean enjoys an international reputation, and Miss Stevenson's ability as an organist, her tact as a choir leader, and her attractive singing, have largely contributed to the success for which the North River choir has long been noted. The ceremony was performed by Rev. A. F. Browne, assisted by Rev. Malcolm McLean, the brother of the groom. Mr. John P. Gordon of Charlottetown, cousin of the groom, acted as groomsman, and Miss Ella Stevenson, sister of the bride, was bridesmaid. The ushers were Walter Scott and Frank McLean. Mendelssohn's beautiful wedding march was rendered by Mrs. A. F. Browne. In a perfectly fitting gown of white silk the bride can only be described as a vision of loveliness, while the bridesmaid in an appropriate dress of white organdie, also looked very beautiful. The invited guests numbered over one hundred. The church was decorated in a most artistic and striking manner. Linely arranged arches on either side indicated the space reserved for the guests. The space between the pews and platform was occupied by a magnificent arch, from the centre of which was suspended a mammoth floral bell, fairly gorgeous with white and other light colored flowers with maple foliage which is just now assuming its most resplendent tinges. During the ceremony the bridal party stood under the bell. The platform was adorned with cut flowers and ferns. A wedding reception was held at Maple Plains, residence of the bride's parents, where Mr. and Mrs. McLean received their friends, under a beautiful arch of autumn leaves. A sumptuous wedding supper was partaken of by a large number of guests. One of the pleasantest features of the evening was the presentation to the bride of a purse of gold,—the gift of the North River church and congregation. The array of beautiful and costly gifts was an additional evidence of the esteem in which the contracting parties are held. The groom's gift to the bride was a gold chain set with pearls, and to the bridesmaid—a handsome gold brooch.
