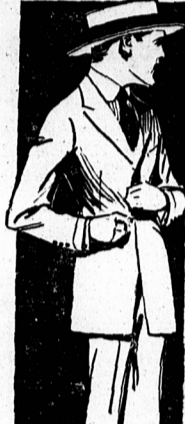

British Scholars' Overseas Bureau

Valuable Work Being Done by Public School Organization

LONDON, July 5.—Following some correspondence in the Times respecting generally the possibilities of the dominions as homes for British public school boys trained to agriculture, and particularly the prospects of a scheme with that object now being carried out by the directors of the well known Christ's Hospital, Mr. W. A. Bulkeley Evans, secretary of the headmaster's conference, writes a letter to the press giving facts about a movement, the existence of which to the British public was practically unknown.

Mr. Evans states that the headmaster's conference, representing

one hundred and forty public schools in this country and the overseas dominions, has had overseas settlement among its objects for some years.

During the war the work was necessarily suspended, as the boys who would have gone to the dominions entered the army instead. But it is now resumed, and hopes are entertained that it will be of great service to all public school boys seeking a career in the dominions. There is a public schools employment bureau, which is a natural expansion of the public schools emigration league, and the object of which is to give advice and assistance to the large number of young men of good education, who yearly leave the public schools faced with the necessity of deciding on a career, and too often drift into unsuitable occupations. The bureau, in addition to a home section, has an overseas section to furnish information, guidance and protection to public school boys intending to make their livelihood on the land or in professional or commercial occupations in the dominions of British colonies.

It is a link with the overseas settlement bureau of the Colonial Office and with the agencies of the overseas governments, and has also under its direction local advisory committees, in Canada, Australia, New Zealand and South Africa, which are ready to give advice and help when difficulties arise. Printed memoranda are issued by the overseas section of the bureau giving information useful to public school boys with reference to Canada, Australia, New Zealand and South Africa; and the conditions under which success is likely to attend the efforts of

World Commerce Convention Ends

First Gathering of International Chambers in London Very Successful

LONDON, July 6.—The International Chamber of Commerce adjourned today after passing resolutions submitted to it by its subordinate groups. A. T. Bedford, chairman of the Standard Oil Company, discussing the results of the convention with the correspondent said:

"We have all been delighted with the success of the meeting. Its value has consisted quite as much in an interchange of opinion and in getting to know each other's point of view as in the formal resolutions.

"George E. Roberts of the National City Bank made a particularly valuable speech, setting forth American conditions that did much to inform the European representatives.

"It was also noticeable how much to real agreement there was when we came down to talking things over in the committees. There was the most frank discussion, but we had little difficulty, once we understood each other at reaching an agreement.

"I really think as a result of all this it will be possible to get together and co-operate heartily and effectively for the reconstruction of world commerce."

Djambi Farce Ends

After 25 Years' Debate Officials Are Given to Combine

THE HAGUE, July 5.—This afternoon the curtain fell on the Djambi farce. The bill passed the First Chamber with 27 against eight votes, giving the valuable oil fields for forty years to a combination of the Batavia Oil Company and the Netherlands Government.

In spite of the fact that the Indian National Assembly had asked to be heard and notwithstanding the advantage over the Standard Oil Company, which coincided with the wish of the American Government to have equal chances the Dutch Government submitted the bill to Parliament, where, after a hot debate, the bill finally was passed, especially because the Catholic members did not want to oppose the Cabinet, fearing the Coalition would come to grief.

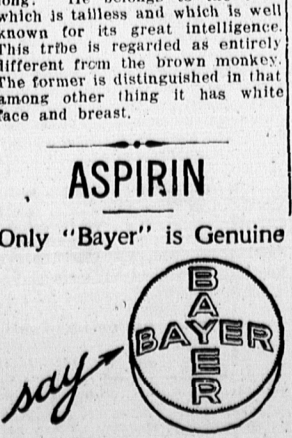
