China Turning To Intensive Farming

WASHINGTON, July 17.—A remarkable development of intensive agriculture in China is shown by a special study of farming in that country, just completed by the Department of Agriculture. China has more than 59,000,000 farmers, who, with their families, comprise 80 to 90 per cent of the nation's total population. Of a total area of more than 3,000,000 square acres of land, about 212,000,000 acres are under cultivation, including 42,000,000 acres of wet lands used chiefly for rice production, and 16,000,000 acres of gardens and fruit orchards. China ranks first among agricultural countries in the production of rice, tea, silk, soy beans and grain sorghums, the report says, and is second only to the United States in tobacco and possibly in wheat production also. On the average China produces more cotton from commercial use than Egypt and including production for local use nearly as much as British India.
