Miss Lois A. Tupper, Girls' Work Secretary of the Maritime Religious Education Council arrived in the Province last Tuesday evening.

On Wednesday evening, Miss Tupper met with the C. G. I. T. group at O'Leary led by Mrs. George Gough, Members of the Mission Circle and the Women's Missionary Society met with the girls. Part of the program was the affiliation ceremony, conducted by Mrs. A. J. Matheson. At the group, Miss Tupper gave an address on different phases of the work, and the relationship between the M.R.E.C. and C. G. I. T.

The following evening Miss Tupper met with the newly-organized group at Trinity Church, Summerside, under the leadership of Miss Jean Nicholson. Mothers and friends were also present. Miss Tupper led the girls in a model O.G.I.T. meeting, including worship, business, recreation and discussion of program planning and activities.

Friday evening, the Kensington United C. G. I. T. welcomed Miss Tupper, mothers and a large number of friends were guests. The regular group meeting was led by the president, Eleanor MacMurdo. The study was introduced by the leader, Mrs. L. M. Murray. A session of lively games and a sing-song were led by Miss Tupper.

A history of the C. G. I. T. movement, and aims of the movement as an all-round program of Christian education, including girls within the churches, was the subject of a brief address by Miss Tupper.

A very pleasant social hour and a delicious lunch closed the meeting. On Sunday morning Miss Tupper was the guest speaker at the regular worship service of the Kensington United Church. This was the annual C. G. I. T. service. The service was conducted by Marilyn Rupert, president of the group. The choir, led by Mrs. Jean Robinson and prayer by Mrs. J. Judson Levy. Miss Tupper gave a very inspiring address on the subject of "The Christian Life".

Montreal Fur Sales For March

Silver fox fully maintained February sale prices, with a high percentage sold at the March General Sale on Friday of the Montreal Fur Sales (Canada) Limited. The feature was the feature with 10 per cent officially reported sold at an advance of 10 per cent over February sale. Whitefaces were also in high demand but were unchanged with 80 per cent of the catalogue sold. Ranch Mink, which advanced 5 per cent on a turnover of 80 per cent, led the Wild Fur. New York dealers bought outstanding silver fox and special ranch mink, lynx and beaver.

The auction company's official report was as follows: Silver Fox: Platina—80 per cent sold, advanced 10 per cent compared with February; Whitefaces 80 per cent sold, unchanged; Pearl Platina—25 per cent sold, unchanged; Full silvers 75 per cent sold, unchanged; 1-2 to 3-4 Silvers 70 per cent sold, unchanged; Inferior types 85 per cent sold, advanced 5 per cent; low grades 80 per cent sold, advanced 5 per cent.

HEALTH REPORT - The report of Dr. B. C. Keeping, City Health Officer, for the month of February shows 38 old cases of venereal disease were treated. Of these, 14 were male and 24 female. There were eight new cases - four male and four female. Communicable diseases in the City last month also included one case of scarlet fever and one of diphtheria.

POLICE REPORT - The City Police Report for February, as submitted to the City Council last night, revealed there had been four prosecutions under the Prohibition Act with three convictions and 14 prosecutions under the Excise Act for brewing beer without license. Those arrested in nine convictions. The report also showed \$600 had been collected in Prohibition fines, \$110 collected in Excise fines, and \$214.50 for other offences, making a total of \$1945.00.

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Routine Business At S'ide Council Meeting

Only routine business was discussed at the regular monthly meeting of the Summerside Town Council held last evening. Mayor J. F. Arnet presided and all the Councilors except Councillor Smallman were present.

On motion of Councillor R. L. Mollison, seconded by Councillor J. L. Gorrill the salary of the Mayor was set at \$850. Councillor Mollison informed the meeting that an application had been received from Mr. Ross MacKenzie, former assistant Town Clerk, for the position of Town Clerk and he moved that as there is no vacancy for this position the application be received and filed. The motion was seconded by Councillor Gorrill and passed.

Councillor Gorrill, reporting for the street committee said he knew the streets were rough but he was doing the best he could. Councilor Henry Wedge suggested that the foreman make a tour of the streets every day at noon looking for holes filled with water that should be attended to. Councilor Gorrill said the street truck was laid up and the foreman had no means of getting around but that any reports from the citizens of that nature were always attended to.

On motion of Councillor Wedge and seconded by Councillor McNeil the Ladies' Aid of the Prince County Hospital was given authority to hold a tag day on June 30 and July 2. Included in the business transacted was a motion, moved by Councillor Mollison and seconded by Councillor Gorrill to the effect that all honorably discharged veterans of world war two residing in Summerside should be exempted from paying poll tax for the year 1945.
