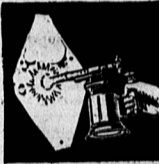

BRITISH FLIER HOPS 421 MILES IN TINY PLANE

NOTTINGHAM, Eng., Aug. 2.—The era of the aerial fliers has dawned here. What looked like a slightly oversized bird flew rapidly over the city and swooped down on a landing field in the suburbs. An aviator hopped out. He had made the 121 miles from Stag Lane

Aldrome, London, in 39 1/2 minutes in his Tiger-Moth monoplane only 18 feet across, propelled by a 130 horsepower four-cylinder air-cooled motor. His speed was nearly 184 miles an hour. The feat of the tiny plane caused a sensation in England and immediate inquiries led to the statement by its manufacturers that it can be turned out cheaply.

To Editor, Eastern Chronicle: Dear Sir:

Your article "Hay and Salt" in last week's issue, though timely, may not be considered seriously by many farmers, because the ideas contained therein are given by a man who is interested in salt and wants to sell his products. The writer, although born on a farm, left home when young, but returned to farm and during the past ten years spent a part of each day working on the farm and studied closely with the keenest observation possible—the working of a farm with a brother who was able to grow sufficient hay and clover of the very best quality to feed a herd from 16 to 20 milk cows and 4 horses, without having to buy any extra during the year. heart action that physicians administer whisky to patients."

Cornfields Agitated

Now the fight swings back and forth across the cornlands, from town to town. Various local chapters of the W. C. T. U. condemn Gilliom by the wholesale. Even the organized workmen join in. One labor union denounced him for not sooner coming to the aid of "less prominent citizens."

And, to make it worse, Mrs. Ed. Jackson, wife of the Governor, whose life, it is claimed, was saved by a pint of medicinal whisky illegally obtained by the Governor, is a member of the Central W. C. T. U. of Indianapolis. Imagine how Governor Jackson, entangled in the present Stephen-Klan scandal and not happy over it, feels these days when fellow club members of his wife want him prosecuted for buying a pint of liquor.

"Would you do it again," this reporter asked Governor Jackson, "if it were a matter of life and death?" "I don't like to talk about it," he replied. "I think my action when my wife was sick is self-explanatory."

He smiled meaningly. But the opposition to Gilliom, who caused the Governor so much embarrassment by reminding him, in a letter, of that controversial pint of whisky, continues to grow, and his opponents say Gilliom's present office of Attorney General—the first he ever ran for—will be his last.

"The move to restore whisky as a medicine is really a sinister move to break down the prohibition laws and restore liquor," an Anti-Saloon League official told the Rotary Club at Newcastle, Ind.

Meanwhile, Mr. Gilliom, as chief enforcement officer, continues to instruct local county attorneys to enforce the dry law and his deputies proceed to prosecute the boot-

proves it," he says. And he hastens to charge that dry speakers are moving up and down the State capitalizing on his medicinal whisky views "by misrepresentation" and collecting funds from church audiences, "keeping \$20 per speech and turning in the rest for unknown purposes."

E. S. Shumaker, his most eloquent dry opponent, told the writer that Mr. Gilliom's statement was "a plain untruth, because all moneys collected are accounted for to the Anti-Saloon League trustees."

But he did not deny that the organized dries of Indiana are gathering forces to combat Gilliom. By his earnestness and his frank courage Gilliom has made himself, almost overnight, the outstanding foe of the prohibitionists. He is the lone wolf in the troubled Middle West's liquor situation.

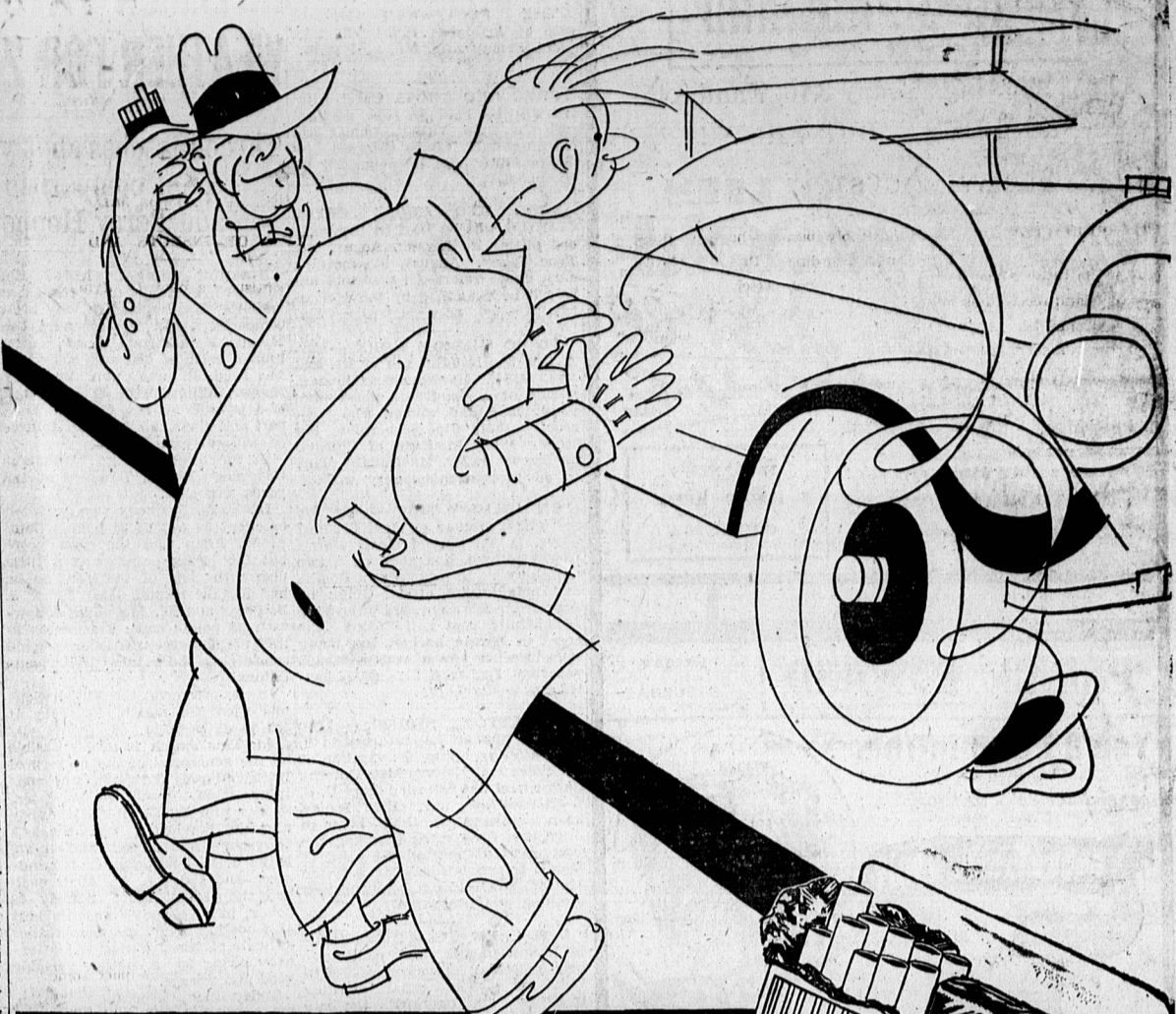

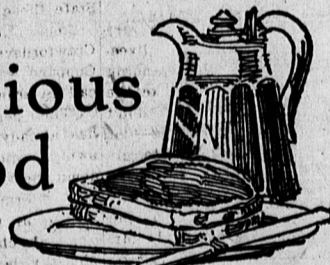

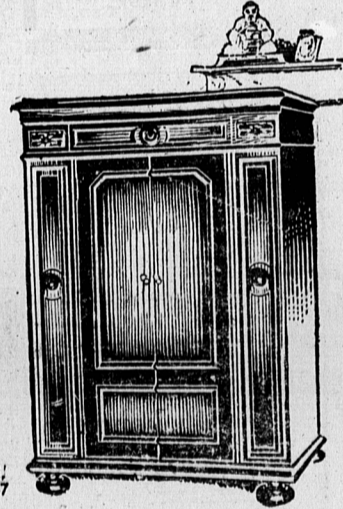
