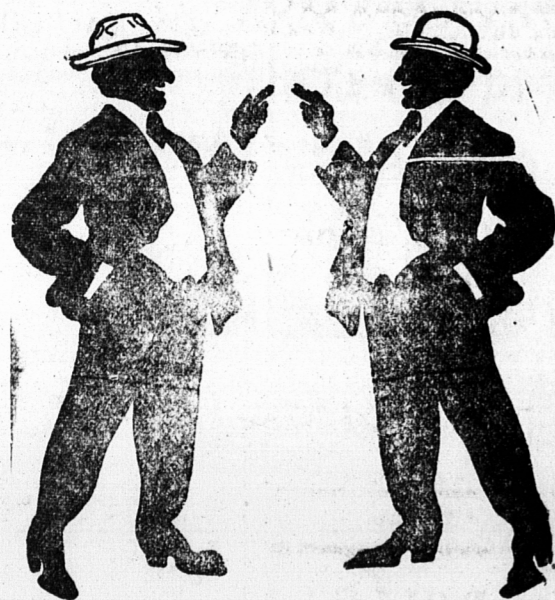

FORECASTING THE WINTER.

The sun, which had been apparently moving southward since 21st June last, reached the extreme southern point of his journey a few days ago on 22nd December, stood still for a moment and turned northward again. The word solstice is made up of two roots which mean the sun standing still. At the time of the winter solstice the days reach their shortest duration, the nights their greatest length, and winter begins. If the seasons did not lag behind the sun in their movements we should have midwinter at the solstice, but the middle of the Canadian winter does not come till the first week in February.

It has passed into a proverb that "as the days begin to lengthen the cold begins to strengthen," and there is every prospect that the truth of this proverb will be realized this year, after the long-continued fine weather of the past months. Few can recall a finer month of December than we have had so far, or a finer Christmas day than that of Monday last. We have yet had no very cold weather or very bad storms. Navigation has been kept open, affording facilities for shipments of our products abroad, while good sleighing and good prices for

farm stuff have stimulated trade between the country districts and the towns.

What yet the winter has in store for us no man can tell. Weather forecasts may be made for a day or sometimes two days in advance with considerable accuracy by the Weather Bureau, and these forecasts printed at the head of The Guardian's first page daily will be found mainly reliable. It is quite practicable to make these daily predictions with the reports from hundreds of observatories covering all parts of the continent and adjacent islands before the person making the forecast, giving several times each day and night the indications of the thermometer and of the barometer, the direction and velocity of the wind and the percentage of cloud at their various localities. Beyond this the best meteorological science of the day does not venture.

The fact that the most advanced science admits its profound and constant ignorance of the kind of weather we shall enjoy or suffer next week or next month does not prevent various persons from making a forecast of the entire winter or a part of it on their own account. Some of these base their prognostications on the crop of nuts or winter berries; others study the spleen of slaughtered animals, or the famous goose-bone; still others observe whether the feathering of wild birds extends far down toward their toes, or whether the muskrat has built his winter home with thicker or thinner walls than usual. And there are others who inquire of the Indians, or cast their weather horoscope from the moon. But it is found that these forecasts do not always by any means agree with each other, and it may be assumed that the best of them are no more reliable than mere guesses. The fact is that we know just about as much as to the weather of the coming three months as we knew last year at Christmas of the winter then beginning, and that was not very much.

Archbishop Bruchesi of Montreal has become a veritable apostle of temperance and is doing in this and other ways an incalculable amount of good in his diocese. On the day before Christmas he issued a mandament against intemperance which was read on Christmas day in all the churches under his jurisdiction. He announces that he will soon begin a crusade against intoxicating liquors, in which he expects the clergy and heads of families to take the lead. "Let all kinds of alcohol disappear from the homes," the letter reads in part, "and let the treating practice be done away with and temperance leagues be established in every parish for children, young men and heads of families with St. John Baptist as patron."

Two things stand out clearly in the appalling condition of Russia today. One is that but for the support of the army the Government would speedily be overthrown. The other is that the strike movement is organized upon a scale of magnitude hitherto unknown, and there must be behind it men of extraordinary ability and force whose names are not yet known to the world. If the people had arms the revolution would speedily triumph. Should the army, already half-hearted in its support of the throne, weaken in its support or refuse to shoot down the unarmed people, the end would speedily come. As it is anything may happen in Russia within a week or a month which no man can now foresee.

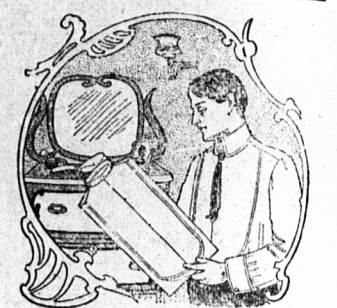
