CANADA AT WASHINGTON.

It is said that President Roosevelt has quite informally, of course, hinted at the desirability of having a Canadian representative directly associated with the British Embassy at Washington. If this is true the President deserves the thanks of the people of Canada. And it is to be hoped that his suggestion may bear fruit. It is based upon common sense and the convenience and welfare of both the United States and Canada.

Here are two nations in America, side by side with 3,500 miles of boundary line between them. A score of railways and telegraph lines, many rivers and a thousand roads and channels of communication cross this boundary. There are rich fisheries in the border waters. The tale between the two countries is of vast volume. In connection with this in communication of trade, travel and industry, rushing trains and swift steamers, postal, telegraph and telephone services across the line, conflicts of interest from time to time arise, almost daily in fact, and what are our resources for prompt and equitable settlement?

Simply this, that before anything can be done the Canadian Government must instruct the British Colonial Office, and the British Colonial Office must instruct the Foreign Office, and the Foreign Office must instruct the British Ambassador at Washington, and the Ambassador must instruct one of his clerks, concerning a matter about which the entire line of British officials know very little and are but very little interested. What wonder that the officials of the Washington State Department, who know their business, get the better of us in nine cases out of ten!

In these matters which are matters of business between Ottawa and Washington, we have endless circumlocution where we ought to have direct dealings. It is true that in the larger matters which come before High Commissions and that sort of thing, Canada has been represented from time to time. Sir John Macdonald, George Brown, Sir Louis Davies and others rendered good service in this way. But for the ordinary, every day business between the two countries Canada is wholly dependent on Downing Street and circumlocution. A Canadian attaché to the British Embassy at Washington ought to be of great service to Canada, under the circumstances, and would be welcome there, for our neighbors like ourselves would like to deal with principals and to deal directly, instead of in the present round-about fashion.

Aenes McCharles of Sudbury, Ont. by his will bequeathed \$10,000 to the University of Toronto on condition that the interest therefrom shall from time to time—not necessarily every year—be paid to any Canadian who discovers any new and valuable method of treating Canadian ores or minerals; or for the discovery of any device that will lessen the dangers in using electricity for power purposes; or for any marked distinction achieved by a Canadian in scientific research. It is a repetition on a small scale of the splendid world prizes given by Bernard Noble, the Swedish millionaire.

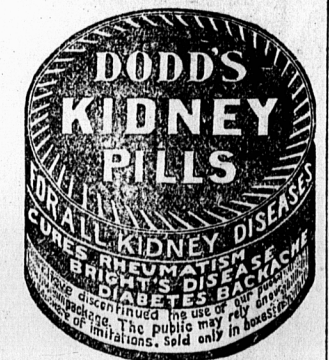
Mineral production in Canada during 1905 was eight and a half million dollars ahead of 1904 and two millions better than in 1901, the best previous year. Coal produced was worth \$17,058,015; gold \$14,486,833; nickel \$7,530,500; pig iron \$6,492,972; and so on, the total being \$68,574,707.

A private note from a Charlotteman dated San Francisco, September 20 says: "Nothing can describe the situation better than this. It is an awful sight, and everything at a standstill, not a building of any note under construction." We judge from this that the expectations of a rapid restoration of the Pacific metropolis are not being realized and that the city will but slowly regain its former beauty and prosperity.

Very general regret was felt and expressed over the news wired from St. John to the afternoon papers that Centenary Church was on fire. This is the finest Methodist church edifice in the Maritime Provinces. It was built of stone and stands on very high ground, where there may be just now a deficiency of water pressure for successfully combating the flames. Our despatches give the latest news of the regrettable disaster.

Ernest Terry, who has sent out to Canada by the distress committee of Leeds, reports to the Leeds Yorkshire Post among other things that Englishmen are not popular in Canada. Men of other nationalities are preferred by employers as they work harder and are not so independent. Among other things he writes: "The conditions (for laborers and artisans) are much harder than in England. Any man who is not both able and willing to work very hard indeed, and to work continuously, is quickly turned off. Everything is done on the American system of 'hustle,' and loafing or even slowness is not tolerated. There is a great demand for women for domestic service. The cost of living is very much higher than in England, and the standard very much lower. Food is about the same price, tea, butter, and cheese being rather cheaper. Meat is about the same price, but is of inferior quality. Everything else is very expensive and inferior."

The Summerside Journal of the 28th inst. states that the Fish and Game Association calls attention to the fact that snipe and woodcock cannot lawfully be shot either this year or next year. The Journal is in error. What the Association called attention to was that partridges must not be killed either this year or next year, and that snipe and woodcock must not be killed this year before 1st October. A reference to the Game Act 1906 will make this clear.

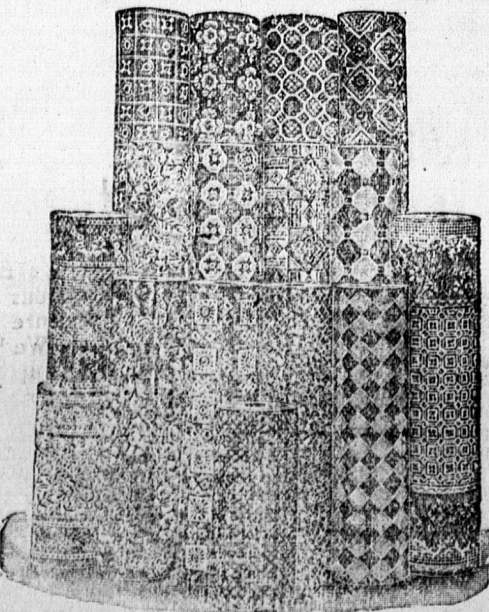
