SERBS AND FRENCH NOW IN MACEDONIA

Have Captured Three Positions from Bulgarians, the Serbs Gaining a Foothold in Nidje Mountains and Capturing 1,500 Prisoners.

(Special to the Guardian) LONDON, Sept. 17.—The Serbs and French have begun an advance into Macedonia at a point about twenty five miles due east of Monastir.

1500 BULGARIANS CAPTURED Fifteen hundred prisoners and many Bulgarian guns have been captured in Macedonia and have progressed more than five miles according to a Serbian official statement received here.

ALLIED ARMIES CAPTURE IMPORTANT POSITIONS

French Have Taken Valley and High Ground on Banks of Aisne with 900 Prisoners, a Total of 4,400 Since Saturday. The Road Now Practically Clear to Main Hindenburg Line. Aerial Activity Renewed with Better Weather, 44 Enemy Machines Downed Sunday.

(Special to The Guardian) LONDON, Sept. 17.—The most important news of the day is contained in the French report which tells of the capture of ground north east of Sancy and of the town of Vailey on the north bank of the Aisne River, together with 900 prisoners, making 4,400 since Saturday on this sector.

GREAT AERIAL ACTIVITIES Aerial activity has been resumed on a great scale after a week of unfavorable weather. British aviators on Saturday night heavily and repeatedly bombed four enemy airdromes with excellent results completely demolishing two Hangars.

A JOB FOR THE BIG GUNS On the Peronne St. Quentin road the breaching of the line is a job for the big guns and the heavier tanks and it may be that the Cambrai show will monopolize their services for some little time.

BRITISH ADVANCE ON TWO MILE FRONT Sir Douglas Haig tells of an advance on a two mile front on the sides of the Ypres Comines Canal to the north of the Messines Ridge.

BRITISH DRAW NEARER ST. QUENTIN (Special to The Guardian) LONDON, Sept. 17.—Last night witnessed a further closing in of the British lines north west of St. Quentin. Field Marshal Haig in his report today announced that the British had made progress in this area in the direction of Leverquiere.

AMERICANS BUSY IN UPPER ALSACE

French and Americans Within 18 Miles of the Rhine. Enemy Bombardment Indicates an Intended Attack Upon Allied Lines.
