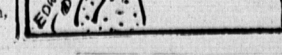
Big Wager On Golf Marathon

Robinson's Stand Against Parker Overshadows All In Tennis Championships

By JACK CALDER Canadian Press Staff Writer TORONTO, Aug. 4—Two of Canada's four Davis Cup players sped into singles semi-finals with two United States stars at the Canadian tennis championships today, but the day belonged to slim-poker faced Gordon Robinson of Stamford, Ont., who lost in quarter finals.

It was Robinson's unexpected stand against the march of one of the game's greatest court coverers, Frankie Parker, that stole the scene from the victories of Parker, Wilmer Allison of Austin, Texas, Bobby Murray of Montreal, and Ross Wilson of Toronto. Parker survived a mid-match storm to win 6-2, 3-6, 7-5, 6-2, but he was disqualified for the first time in four rounds.

Parker vs. Wilson Today
Parker's victory, pitting him against Wilson's slam game in tomorrow's rounds, was the only one of the four to require an extra set. Allison defeated Laird Watt of Montreal, 6-1, 6-3, 6-4, to qualify to meet Murray, who stopped Carl Fischer of Detroit, 6-4, 6-3, 7-5, 6-0.

In the other semi final bracket Allison and Parker, who defeated Lewis Duff of Montreal and Doug Cameron, Vancouver, 6-1, 6-2, 6-3, will oppose Fischer and Bob Madson, Detroit, winners over Roger Durivage and Bill O'Brien of Montreal, 6-4, 6-4, 6-2.

Claire Walsh, steady University of Toronto student, will meet Mrs. Allison defeated Laird Watt of Montreal, 6-1, 6-3, 6-4, to qualify to meet Murray, who stopped Carl Fischer of Detroit, 6-4, 6-3, 7-5, 6-0.

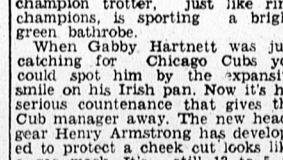
