### Canadiens Widen Section Lead By Defeating Red Wings 4-1 At Detroit

MONTREAL, Jan. 12—Smothering Detroit's offensive with relentless backchecking, Montreal Canadiens defeated the Red Wings 4-1 tonight to widen their Canadian section lead in the National Hockey League once more to six points.

Canadiens won easily after overtaking an early Detroit lead, shot by Eddie Goodfellow, with the help of Marty Barry and Johnny Sorrell after 13 minutes of the first period. They evened the game when George Mantha scored a "break" goal four minutes later and never were threatened after that.

Despite the defeat, Detroit held to their two-point lead over the idle New York Rangers in the United States section.

Rookie George Brown scored what proved to be the winning goal midway through the second period, deflecting Babe Siebert's long shot past the pudgy Norm Smith. A few minutes after that, Johnny Gagnon fired a snap, pivot shot from 35 feet and Smith never saw it until it was in the net.

Joffre Deslites former Saint John Beaver, finished off the night's entertainment for 6,500 fans with a solo goal in the last minute. He broke from a five man Red Wing rush and moved the puck around Smith easily after forcing the net man to the first move.

**CHABOT BRILLIANT**

NEW YORK, Jan. 12—New York Americans at the bottom of the National Hockey League's Canadian section, ended their losing streak tonight with a 4-0 defeat of the second-place Montreal Maroons.

The victory before 11,000 fans brightened a record of 12 defeats in 13 starts and landed the crippled Amerks within one point of the third place Toronto Maple Leafs. Maroon at the same time dropped three full games behind Montreal Canadiens.

Americans took the lead in the first period on Tommy Anderson's hot shot from the penalty circle. Eddie Wiseman of Newcastle, N. B. made the play for the goal.

The winners broke loose in the second frame and outplayed the big red team. Twice Amerks scored in this period, Lorne Carr tallying

on passes from Sweeney Schriener and Art Chapman, and Happy Emms finding the net on a penalty shot after Cy Wentworth had tripped Neil Stewart who was in scoring position.

Maroons opened up wide in the last frame and this gave the New Yorkers an opportunity to break away for their fourth goal which went to Chapman when he darted in to rap Schriener's rebound into the Montreal cage.

The game while fast and rugged was clearly fought and only four penalties were meted out. Lorne Chabot who was playing his second game in place of the injured Roy Worters turned in a sparkling performance and seemed to have regained his old time form.

BOSTON, Jan. 12—Undaunted by the absence of their top scorer, the Chicago Black Hawks turned on Boston tonight for their first National Hockey League win of the season against the Bruins, but the 4-2 victory still left them deep in the league's United States sectional cellar.

One of the smallest crowds of the season, 9,000 saw the game. Chicago was without Paul Thompson. The Bruins out-played their rivals from start to finish and kept their five mobile players charging most of the time. ### Rangers Speed To 7-4 Win Over Royals In Fa Junior League Encounter

The fast-stepping Junior Rangers, clicking in every department last night speed to a 7-4 victory over the Royals in a Junior League encounter to go into a tie for first place in the standing.

Jumping into the lead in the first two minutes of the game on a freak goal that caromed into the net off the screen, the winners were never headed thereafter, at one time in the final session having a five goal lead only to have the hard-fighting, but inexperienced Royals cut the margin to three in the final five minutes of the game.

Wide open, and rugged with the teams hitting a fast dip throughout every session the game was of the crowd-pleasing variety with a brief fist fight thrown in for good measure. Nine penalties were handed out with Royals drawing the odd one, but despite this all eleven goals were scored with the teams at full strength.

Rangers, at the peak of their form had the edge all the way through and their tricky passing attacks carried them into close scoring range time after time to harass the Royal goalie, who, despite having seven goals scored on him, nevertheless gave a smart hand wherever the form that carried them to victory in their opening encounter. Poor clearing in their defending zone was their big fault last night giving their opponents openings that the Rangers were quick to take advantage of. Despite this however, they held the winners even in the matter of goals in the final two sessions after giving the Rangers a 3-0 lead in the first period.

"Tarky" Whitlock, centring the first string Ranger line got credit for the first goal of the game two minutes after the start when he let drive from outside the line. The puck bouncing back off the screen trickled down McAleer's arm to roll into the cage. Upset by this though break the Royals were continually on the defensive in the first few minutes but despite two penalties managed, with the aid of sensational work by McAleer, to hold the Rangers off.
