

Intermediate Abegweits Win City League Title

Fine Racing On S'Side And Ch'Town Harbors Saturday Afternoon

Another Great S'Side Race Meet

Four Classes Took The Word And Furnished Close And Exciting Finishes.

SUMMERSIDE, Mar. 2.—There was another good meet on the ice of Summerside Harbor on Saturday afternoon, and a very large gathering of enthusiastic spectators enjoying a fine and clean program of real sport on good ice consisting of four keenly contested races.

The Class A Trot had three starters. Bud Doble, owned and driven by Jos Shean of Kensington won in two straight heats, being closely pushed by Peter Will Tell, owned by Cyril Kenney, of Summerside and driven by the owner in the first heat, and for the remainder of the race by George Callbeck. Eastern Lady, driven by Geo. Thompson, finished second in the first heat and was just nosed out in the last heat by Peter Will Tell. Eastern Lady has improved very much since her last race a week ago.

In the Class A Pace, there were also three starters. Fernwood Aubrey, ably driven by Dr. Church, went a wonderful race and won in two straight heats from Bud Hal and Cyril F. J. This was a great race between Fernwood Aubrey and Bud Hal, owned by Robert Baker and driven by Mac Steele, as only inches separated these horses from start to finish. Cyril F. J., owned and driven by George Callbeck, was badly off color, suffering from a nasty quarter cut.

For the Class B Pace, only two horses answered to the starter's bell. Tommy L., owned by W. B. McNeill of Summerside and driven by Johnnie Crockett, and Capt. Calkins, owned by Ray Lidstone of Freetown and driven by Geo. Callbeck. This was a great race in each heat and a blanket would almost have covered both horses from start to finish; Capt. Calkins winning by inches.

There were five starters in Class C, which was won in straight heats by Helen S., owned and driven by Geo. Sobey, of Wilnot. This mare proved that she has plenty of speed, together with staying power. Laddie owned and driven by Lieut.-Col. U.

Reports that Jonny Conroy would be located at Presque Isle and be identified with John Willard this spring are apparently not going to work out.

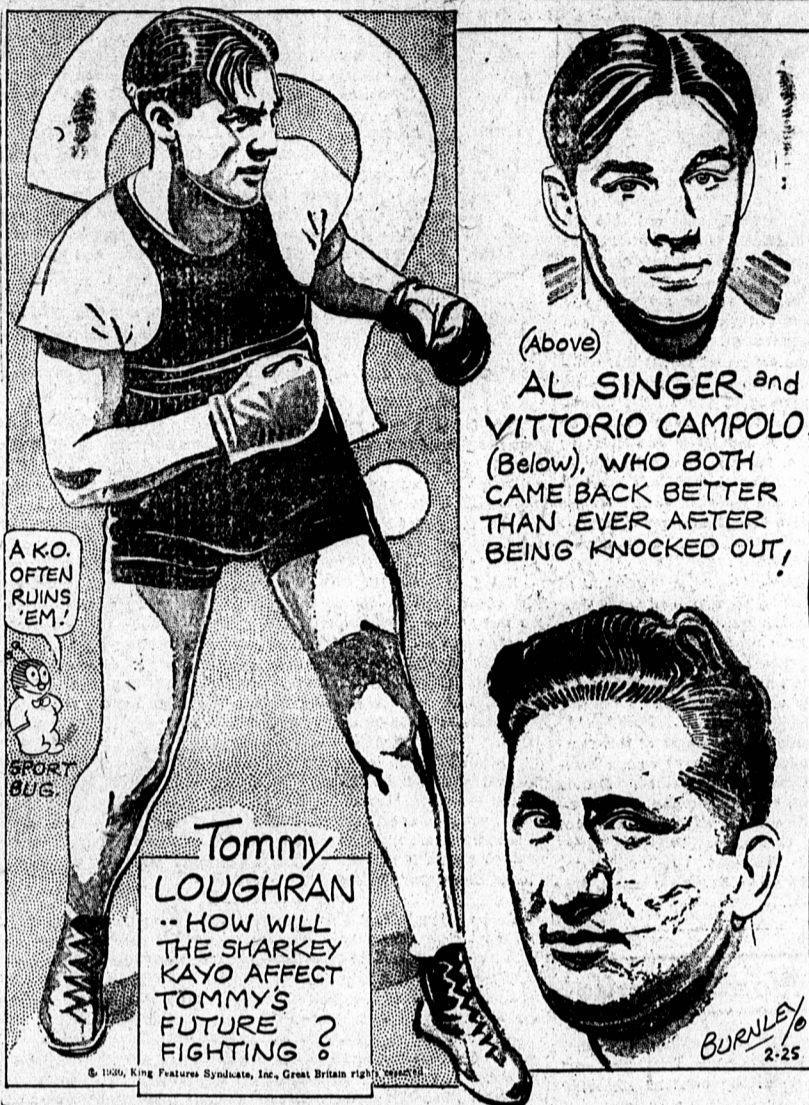

That Spectre Of The K. O.



When Tommy Loughran squares off in his next fight, will his glowing opponent remind him of that evening in New York City last September when Jack Sharkey in a berserk burst knocked him out for the first time in his glittering ring career? On that occasion the Philadelphia phantom had held the crafty sailor almost even in a lively first round. Soon after the second started, Sharkey rushed in and landed one of the heaviest rights ever on the cheek bone just to the left of Tommy's nose. Loughran crashed to the canvas, but his fighting instinct brought him to his feet at the count of nine. Then occurred a brief but truly extraordinary scene. Loughran

turned his back towards Sharkey, grasped the nearest rope with one hand, looked with unseeing eyes towards the vast crowd and started walking towards a neutral corner. The referee stepped up close to Tommy who requested dreamily: "Get me a chair, please!" And the ref did, awarding Sharkey a knockout victory of course.
Now Loughran is one of the brainiest battlers who ever boxed for a living. His strong mind probably can conquer even subconscious fear. Others have done it admirably. Jack Dempsey, Benny Leonard and Jack Sharkey all experienced that ten-second toll of defeat early in their careers. Stanley Ketchel, Johnny

Dundee and Al Singer ran into such set-backs when fairly seasoned. Yet none of those genuine greats were cowed by kayos. Loughran seems to belong to their class. He naturally merits membership in that brave brotherhood.
Occasionally fear of a knockout is overcome when one is punched cold. O' Mike McTigue was simply a matter of cautious boxing for years until he took a sleep punch. He found that experience not so cruel. From that time on, Mike grew bold, became a knocker-out himself, and only the fact he started so late curtailed McTigue's K. O. record.
Yes, all great fighters must—and do—conquer the haunting effects of knockouts.

JIM MCLARNIN GIVES MANDELL HARD DRUBBING

most convincing defeat of his career in his ten round battle fought in the Chicago Stadium last night.
McLarnin, a leading contender for the world's welterweight title, won every round, forcing Mandell on the defense from start to finish. Mandell's title was not at stake as the battle was fought at catchweights.
The expected difference in poundage in the two men diminished surprisingly however, when they scaled at 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon. McLarnin had only a 2 1/2 pound weight advantage, scaling 142 1/2, with the lightweight champion weighing in at 140, five pounds above the lightweight limit.

Tunney Through With Boxing

MIAMI, Fla., March 2.—Gene Tunney, retired undefeated heavyweight boxing champion of the world, plans to "get well," he said today, and then go into "some business." Conquering from a recent operation in New York the man who left the ring and the championship behind 18 months ago looked forward with keen anticipation to seeing the heavyweights, who seek the honor he has discarded, do battle tonight. He has not seen a ring since he climbed between the ropes at the Yankee Stadium in July, 1928, after his farewell bout with the rugged Tom Heeney as his last victim.

FREE FOR ALL TROT

This was the first race called and had the old reliable trio who have battled right along this winter and yet have not entirely satisfied their friends as to which is the best horse. In the first two heats Briar Mac seemed to have the speed and after the eighth was run drew away from the others finishing with half a length to the good, Captain Jackson second the first heat and Watts Edition second the second heat. In the third heat Watts Edition was trotting like a storm and before half the course was finished was leading by a full length, Briar Mac and Captain Jackson both made a great try to get him, Jackson succeeding in getting to his shoulder, Briar back at his pad. This was a lovely finish and Mr. Trainor, the owner of Watts Edition, came in for a lot of praise for his splendid drive. Briar Mac having won the first two heats was declared the winner.

CLASS A PACE

This had only two starters. The first two heats were won by Butcher Boy, Colorado P. making breaks perhaps due to the bad spots in the ice. In the third heat Colorado P. was full of pace and won by a big margin from Butcher Boy.

CLASS A TROT

This was a real bang-up contest. Peter Verde was in much better form due to his having had a race last week which put him on edge. In the first heat Mack Todd was leading by a length half way down the course, then Peter finished very fast almost getting to Mack at the wire. It was an exciting heat and brought cheers from the spectators. The second heat Mack was again leading to within 100 yards from the wire, then Peter put on a great burst and drew away from Mack, Mack going to a break and Peter winning by half a length.

Third heat. This was a nose and nose contest throughout the entire length, except for a couple of little breaks when Mack Todd would get behind slightly only to come on trotting furiously. It ended with Peter Verde having half a length to the good.

CLASS B TROT

La Rico and Dapper Don were the contestants. The first two heats Dapper Don did not seem to display his old time speed and La Rico won comfortably. In the third heat La Rico made two breaks while Dapper stayed strictly on the trot.

GREEN RACE

This had two starters, both Longsets, who showed a lot of speed for the short time they have been working. Hush, which by the way, is out of a thoroughbred dam, showed a classy way of pacing, winning comfortably from Sybil Set. The time made in the second heat, 33 1/2 seconds, is certainly wonderful when it is considered that this youngster has only been pacing a few weeks.
