THE CITIZENS' COMMITTEE.
A meeting of the Citizens' Prohibitory
Committee was held last evening when
reports were heard from sub-committees
who had been appointed to wait upon the
Lieutenant Governor in regard to pardon-
ing liquor sellers committed to jail for
violations of the Act and also the Premier
in regard to an increase of salary for Pro-
secutor Jenkins and the more thorough
enforcement of the Act. The sub-com-
mittee reported in substance, that in view
of the faithfulness of Mr. Jenkins and
the large amount of fines collected by
him the failure of the Government
thus far to grant the increased compensa-
tion sought, can only be taken as
evidence of their insincerity as regards
the enforcement of their own law. The
report was referred back to the sub-
committee in order that a definite reply
may be obtained from the Premier.
It was also reported that the Lieuten-
ant Governor gave to the sub-committee
which waited upon him his assurance
that there would be no further interfer-
ence on his part except in an extreme
case such as would receive the approval
of the committee themselves.
Senator Lodge, one of the United
States members of the Alaskan Boundary
Commission, expresses the opinion that
the Commission will complete its labor
before October 25.

TWO SCHOOL SESSIONS DAILY.
The question of one or two sessions
daily for the schools is one which will not
down. Like other matters of difference
it can only be settled when it is settled
in accordance with the popular desire.
Parents desire to see their children at
table at the usual meal hours, and with
but one long session at school from 9 a.
m. to 2 p. m. this is impossible. It is a
great inconvenience to the many to have
the children come home for their mid-
day meal at 2:15 to 3:30 o'clock and not
withstanding this inconvenience the
children do not get as good or satisfactory
a midday meal as when they are able to
be at home at the time their parents and
other members of the family sit down to
dinner. And the long fast from break-
fast till 2:30 is not good for children with
good appetites—is in fact downright in-
jurious to many.
No doubt something can be said on the
other side. The single session saves the
walk home and back to school at midday.
This is an object to those who live at a
distance from school, and especially in
stormy weather. And there is the fact
that not all the people take their midday
meal at the same hour. Where the work-
ing classes generally take their dinners at
midday, others in the residential quarters
take lunch or dinner at one o'clock. But
the schools are for rich and poor alike, and
the sessions should be arranged to give
the best satisfaction to the largest num-
ber. The School Board have peti-
tions and counter petitions before them,
showing the different opinions that pre-
vail, but we believe the considerable
majority favor two sessions. The example
of Boston and other large cities seems to
favor the two session plan. Queen Square
School, since the adoption of two sessions
is well satisfied with the result. The
Women's Council is a pretty wise body
and in matters affecting domestic affairs
can be relied upon to decide rightly. Why
may the Board not revert to the two ses-
sion plan when the schools resume in
September?

Borelli's comet is said to be now visible
to the naked eye. The nucleus is 400,000
miles in diameter, the tail 3,000,000 miles
in length, and the comet is travelling
at a rate of 25 miles a second, so the astro-
nomers say. Those who desire to see the
new wonder of the sky are told to make
their observation on a clear night at about
ten o'clock and to look between the North
Star and the fourth or fifth star of the
great Dipper, "and there you will find it
like a great splash of light, with the tail
pointing upward." If the observer fails
to find the comet with the naked eye
better results may be had with a telescope,
field, or opera glass.
The London Daily News is an influen-
tial and prosperous English journal, largely
controlled by men of high moral
character. It has long refused advertise-
ments intended to give publicity to bet-
ting. Not long ago a letter was directed
to one of the proprietors of the News call-
ing attention to the fact that liquor ad-
vertisements still appeared in that
journal's columns. Now while there are
many newspapers in Canada which re-
fuse to advertise liquors there are yet
but few of the newspapers in the United
Kingdom which do so, temperance senti-
ment not having advanced so rapidly
there as on this side of the Atlantic. But
the proprietors of the Daily News con-
cluded this form of advertising was not
in the public interest and decided to print
no more liquor advertisements. This
means the abandonment of £10,000 (al-
most \$50,000) a year, which the News has
heretofore received from this source.
This is a splendid example of unselfish
sacrifice and devotion to the public wel-
fare.
