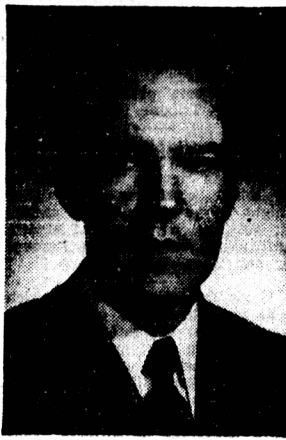

"Now if some fiend was forcing chorus girls to wear these contraptions, we might step in. But if women want to stuff themselves into corsets, there's nothing the Health Service can do about it."
