First National Bank stock dropped \$1,000 a share, being quoted at \$5,000 bid, and most of the other New York bank and trust companies shares fell \$100 to \$120 a share.

Market Opened Heavy In accordance with the ruling announced before the opening of Monday's market the stock exchange closed at 1 o'clock today instead of 3 p. m., but the final quotations were not printed until one hour and 45 minutes after the closing gong had sounded. Total sales for the three hour session were 5,914,760 shares, which contrasts with 6,202,930 shares in the full five hour session Monday.

The stock exchange was closed yesterday, Election Day, a legal holiday in New York State.

The market opened heavy as blocks of 5,000 to 25,000 shares were dumped at initial declines of \$1 to \$6 a share. Losses were gradually extended as the session progressed with trading orderly until the last few minutes of trading when prices of several issues broke \$1 to \$5 between sales in a mad rush of selling. At no time was there any indication of a general rally, although a few stocks made moderate recovery on final sales.

Wall Street Puzzled by Selling. Wall Street was puzzled by this fresh influx of selling, although numerous explanations were forthcoming during the day. The New York banking group, headed by J. P. Morgan & Company, which was organized to assure an orderly market when the first bad break occurred October 24, had no meetings today and issued no statement. In many quarters the bulk of today's selling was believed to represent the liquidation of weakened speculative accounts which had been carried through the first break. Considerable selling also was attributed to disappointed traders who bought stocks on the rally last week or at the opening Monday in anticipation of a further rebound in prices.

Two unfavorable business developments, the sharp decreases on freight car loadings and the falling off in steel demand, which some observers construed as an indication that the recession in security prices had extended to general business also tended to weaken confidence, and influence liquidation by nervous investors and speculators.

"STAND AND DELIVER" FILLED WITH THRILLS Rod La Rocque Scores Triumph in New Star Picture.

Those who demand their thrills in generous portions will heartily applaud "Stand and Deliver," Rod La Rocque's newest Pathe-DeMille star picture, which enjoyed a most auspicious premiere at the Capitol Theatre yesterday.

Splendidly cast in another of the swashbuckling roles in which he has acquitted himself so well in the past, La Rocque scores a distinct triumph in this fast-moving melodramatic romance. His fearless exploits and daring gestures win his audience at once.

"Stand and Deliver," which Donald Crisp directed, is a story of modern Greece, played out against a background of the banditry which seriously threatened that country just after the World War. La Rocque has the role of Roger Norman, a wealthy young Englishman, who joins the Grecian cavalry in quest of the adventures. In a chivalrous moment, while attempting to save a Greek peasant girl from the evil advances of his commanding officer, he unintentionally injures his superior.

Removal of Slums LONDON, Nov. 1.—(By George Hamilton, Canadian Press Staff Correspondent)—Rt. Hon. Arthur Greenwood, Minister of Health, proposes in the present session of parliament to tackle the problem of slum-clearance. In the few weeks before parliament rose at the end of July, Mr. Greenwood brought down a bill to continue the housing subsidy of the Conservative Government. That bill was only preliminary to the larger measure on which he is now engaged. In this, one aim—whether successful or not—will be to cut out the red tape that now hampers the work of slum clearance, to bring about closer cooperation between the Treasury, the Ministry of Health and the local authority.

A special committee appointed by the National Housing and Town Planning Council reported three causes of the comparative failure of slum-clearance despite the many housing-building schemes since the war:— (1). Complication of the process of slum clearance. (2). Inadequate financial assistance from the Exchequer. (3). Overcrowding and the lack of alternative accommodation.

And "complication of process" stands almost unbelievably in the way of providing better housing for the two million children estimated to be living in slumland. It is a circumlocution that reminds one of the house that Jack built. First, the local medical officer of health has to be convinced that such and such an area is unhealthy, that the most satisfactory way of dealing with it is by reconstruction of the houses—all as laid down in certain statutory forms of words. The municipal council has then to be convinced not only that he is right. It must have "sufficiency of resources."

When the municipal council is finally convinced, it has to have the scheme confirmed by the Minister of Health. As a preliminary to con-

Such are the problems that face Mr. Greenwood in his attack on slumland. They are problems not only of procedure and finance but also of psychology. The slum-dweller will sometimes take with him into his new home the habits of the slum.

One actual case brought to the writer's notice was that of a slum family moved from slumland to a neat little house, equipped with modern sanitation and a bathroom. A fortnight after the family had moved in, a slum-worker called to rejoice over the transformation scheme. He found the new house as untidy and dirty as the old.

The bathtub was full of coal. But such a case is unusual. It is estimated that ninety per cent of the inhabitants of slumland respond to the new environment.

Police and constabulary authorities in the Philippines are fighting a bill in the legislature providing that citizens of the Philippines and the United States residing in that country may own firearms without a license.

Sixteen schemes initiated by the Metropolitan Board of Works from 1875 onwards took from five to 15 years to complete. Two schemes in the St. Pancras area of London include 50 two-storey cottages, 130 years old, which have been standing for 32 years since they were condemned. Between April 1, 1925, and Dec. 31, 1928, the number of houses pulled down in slum clearance schemes amounts to only 6,000.

But procedure is only part of the problem. There remains that of finance. The special committee of the National Housing and Town Planning Council recommends that the government's share of the loss by a municipal council on slum clearance should be increased from one-half to two-thirds. It holds that during the next 10 years 1,500,000 working-class homes should be built in England and Wales, of which one million should be let at a weekly rental of 11 shillings (£2.75) gross
