Breakwaters At Tignish To Be Reconstructed

OTTAWA, July 30 (Special)—Tenders for the reconstruction and repair of the breakwaters at Tignish Harbor, Prince County, close on August 7, it was stated by the department of Public Works Department. Both public and private tenders are invited.

Pressure to have the work undertaken this summer and fall has been placed on Works Minister Alphonse Fournier and senior officials of the department by J. Watson MacNaught, Liberal member for Prince. He represented that the present condition of the breakwaters are unserviceable and a detriment to shipping and fishing activities in the region.

It is understood that if tenders are not too far above the government estimate and materials are in view, the department's representations will be considered favorably. Harbor improvements at Tignish include reconstruction of some 545 feet of the south breakwater together with replacement of 250 feet of the north breakwater together with reconstruction of another 90-foot section.

Clamp Curfew On Jewish City Of Tel Aviv

British Troops Make House-To-House Manhunt For Terrorist Suspects.

(By The Canadian Press) JERUSALEM, July 30—British troops, ordered to "shoot to kill" 22-hour-a-day curfew on the 20,000 residents of the all-Jewish city of Tel Aviv and made an intensive house-to-house manhunt for terrorist suspects.

A high ranking officer said arrests might total up to 3,000 in a search lasting several days for members of Irgun Zvai Leumi and the Stern gang, Jewish underground organizations, and other wanted persons. Troops also were believed seeking caches of arms and clandestine radio transmitters operated by the underground.

Master Plan Strips Italy & Satellites

PARIS, July 30—(AP)—(Adapted)—Italy's once boasted war machine would be slashed almost to comic-opera size and the Mussolini Empire that threatened to rival Caesar's would be trimmed to but a thin strip by the draft of the proposed Italian peace treaty.

Disastrous Floods In Northern Anatolia

Harmony Marks Second Day Of Conference

Publicity For All Conference Deliberations Approved.

(By The Associated Press) PARIS, July 30—Prime Minister Attlee and states Storness Byrnes agreed today to strengthen the voice of the small powers in the 21-power European peace conference.

Mr. Attlee said the Big Four powers "should not be unresponsive to the wishes of the nations, especially those nations who have contributed so much to victory."

North America, Asia, Australasia and the United States drew into two wars caused by the failure of the peoples of Europe to find a way to live together in peace.

Mr. Byrnes pledged United States support for any treaty drawn by the Big Four treaty drafts sought by a two-thirds vote of all 21 powers.

MONCTON, N. B., July 30—A change in the tactics of fire-fighters battling a menacing forest fire which has burned voraciously for three days and which has threatened the northeastern summer resort town of Shediac for possible evacuation.

France In Grip Of Communications Strike



Russian Prosecutor Asks Death Penalty

(By The Associated Press) NUREMBERG, Aug. 30—The death penalty for the 22 defendants in the war crimes trial was asked today by Lt.-Gen. R. A. Rudenko, Russian prosecutor, who told the International Military Tribunal that such a verdict "will be greeted with satisfaction by all progressive mankind."

"Speaking on behalf of the U.S. S.R.," Gen. Rudenko said in his summation, "I consider all charges against the defendants as fully proven, and in the name of a sincere love of mankind which inspires the peoples who consented to the greatest sacrifices in order to save the world, freedom and culture, in memory of the millions of innocent human beings slaughtered by a gang of murderers who now are before the court of a progressive mankind, I appeal to the tribunal to sentence all the defendants, without exception, to the supreme penalty."
