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HURRICANE OF APPLAUSE

GREETED CHANCELLOR SCHEDIMANN WHEN HE DENOUNCES PEACE TERMS.

Treaty is Unacceptable Says Chancellor, and Wonders Why World-Wide Protest is Not Made.

(Special to The Guardian.)

BERLIN, May 14.—A declaration by Chancellor Schidemann in the Assembly Monday that the peace terms were unacceptable brought the members of the Assembly the spectators and those in the press gallery to their feet in a hurricane of cheers and applause. The Chancellor reached the climax of his statement on the Peace terms ten minutes after he began. The Chancellor paused in his address and then thundered out the word which announced the German Governments rejection of the Versailles conditions. This treaty he said, is in the view of the imperial Government, unacceptable, so unacceptable, I am unable to believe that this earth could hear such a document without a cry issuing from millions and millions of throats in all lands, without distinction of party. Away with this murderous scheme. With the exception of the independent Socialists led by Hugo Haase all factions in the Assembly rose to their feet and cheered vociferously. The Assembly is sitting temporarily in the Assembly Hall of the University of Berlin on Unter Den Linden.

GERMANS SUBMIT PLAN OF LEAGUE

SIXTY-SIX ARTICLES WITH A SUPPLEMENT NOW UNDER DISCUSSION

Charter of International Labor League Included and Different Aims of the Germans Set Forth.

PARIS, May 14.—The German plan for a League of Nations, submitted by the German delegation at Versailles is now in the hands of the peace conference committee on the League of Nations. The League of Nations to which it was referred contains sixty six articles together with a supplementary setting forth the charter for all international labor league. The special aims of the League of Nations devised by the Germans are set forth as follows: (A) Prevention of international disputes. (B) Disarmament. (C) Securing freedom of traffic and general economical equality of rights. (D) Protection of national minorities. (E) Creation of an international workers charter. (F) Regulation of colonial questions. (G) Unity of existing and future international institutions and the creation of a Parliament. Another provision of the draft reads: The League of Nations shall comprise (A) All belligerent states taking part in the present war. (B) All neutral states included in the Hague Arbitration League. (C) All others to be admitted by vote of two thirds of the existing members; entrance is reserved to the Holy See.

British Officer Makes Air Flight

LONDON, May 14.—Lieut. Col. Wilson of the British staff in Mesopotamia flew from Mosul to England in one week. He crossed the desert from Mosul to Egypt in one day. Mosul is the Turkish city opposite Nineveh, where the prophet Jonah was sent and where he died and was buried.
