

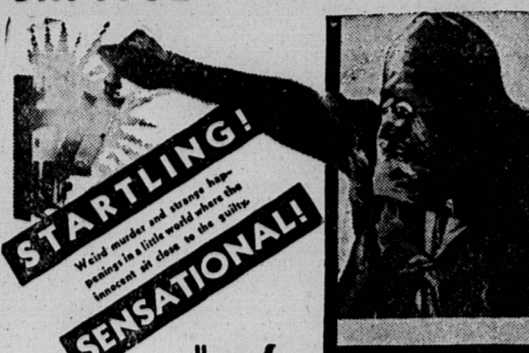

Scots Goat Creates Knotty Problem

MONTREAL, Dec. 5—The Canadian citizenship of Sandy of Weal is at stake.

He has helped up an 11,000 ton ship, delayed the unloading of 2,000 tons of cargo, kept two passengers, sixty seven officers and crew of the ship which brought him here on board for several hours after arriving in Montreal, caused long distance telephone conversations between Montreal and Ottawa, kept officials of the Department of Agriculture awake at night and created a nice little problem as to the precise difference between England and Scotland.

And, by the way, Sandy of Weal is a goat—value, \$450.

Sandy, son of a family which won many championships in the United Kingdom, was purchased in Scotland by H. Marlow, owner of a large Montreal goat farm which supplies milk to hospitals.

He had a great time on the broad Atlantic, becoming friendly with the crew to the extent of devouring four coats and a variety of other articles of human apparel.

All went well until he arrived here on board the freighter Manchester Regiment, when the Department of Agriculture officials discovered that Sandy had sailed from Manchester instead of a port north of the Tweed.

Because of foot and mouth disease in England, entry of swine and goats is forbidden. Sandy's future became blurred with a big question mark.

For several hours after his arrival, Agriculture officials disinfected Sandy and his temporary home. Passengers, officers and crew were compelled to remain on board the ship. In the excitement the cargo was forgotten. Frantic efforts were made to right the situation, but all to no avail.

It now appears—unless Sandy obtains a Ministerial reprieve before the Manchester Regiment sails tomorrow—that he will return to England, travel to Scotland, remain on his native heath for some weeks and sail again for Canada from a port well to the north of the Tweed.
