HOT EDITORIALS IN THE LONDON PAPERS

The Report of the Commission Which Investigated the Mesopotamia Expedition Creates a Sensation

LONDON.—The report of the commission which has been investigating the Mesopotamia expedition is treated by the press as a first-class sensation. Editorials contain bitter reproaches of persons concerned and demand their dismissal.

"Effete traditions, cheese-paring policy and general dry rot and inefficiency," of the Indian command, are condemned by the newspapers. The anti-Asquith press largely blames the late government. One paper calls for former Premier Asquith's impeachment. On the other hand, the Times says it is only fair to admit that his cabinet was led completely astray by military advisers.

The Times thinks the culpability of J. Austin Chamberlain, secretary for India, almost wholly technical. The paper places a large share of the blame on the late Lord Kitchener's highly centralized control of the Indian army. The paper says the report goes far to vindicate Lord Curzon's resignation as viceroy of India twelve years ago, on the ground of disagreement with Kitchener's scheme.

General approval is voiced of the government's decision to publish the report and tell the country the truth. A comparison is drawn of Germany's attempts to explain Messines and other reverses on the eastern front. Amid a flood of recrimination, room is found for satisfaction that nobody who is chiefly blamed, is now associated with the Mesopotamian force, that the blunders have been retrieved, and that to that extent they are less tragic than the irrevocable collapse of the general expedition.

WHOLE REGIMENTS DESERTED IN AUSTRIA

(Canadian Press Despatch.) COPENHAGEN.—The disclosures of the retiring Austrian Minister of Defense, P. von Geogel, before a Reichstag committee, that three Bohemian regiments had during the war gone over to the enemy in a body, and his statement that Czech prisoners of war had volunteered for service against Austria-Hungary in considerable numbers, constitute only a part of the anti-Austrian demonstrations of Bohemian troops, who through long continued conflicts with the Germans for dominance in Bohemia have felt in a way more closely allied with the Russians than with Teuton-ruled Austria. It is a fact freely admitted in Austria-Hungary, although the newspapers have never previously been permitted to refer plainly to it, that from the beginning of the war Bohemians deserted en masse at every opportunity. Certain regiments, as early as the spring of 1915, had been decimated because of their conduct in the face of the enemy. The Royal Bohemian Bodyguard regiment was permanently disbanded at that time and its colors sent to the arsenal in Vienna. It was at about this period that the correspondent saw a naive letter from a Bohemian prisoner in Serbia advising his comrades not to desert while in Serbia, as the conditions of residence there were too unpleasant.

TO ASCERTAIN TRUTH OF GRIM REPORT

AT AN ATLANTIC PORT.—Several cakes of soap which according to a German war prisoner were made from fat taken by the Germans from the bodies of dead soldiers, were brought here today from the west front by Dr. Georges Fouchet. The soap was found on the prisoner, Dr. Fouchet will take it to Washington where it will be analyzed in an attempt to determine the truth of the charges that the Germans are grinding up and distilling human bodies in order to use the oils and fats they contain. The first assertions that bodies were utilized by the Germans for this purpose were made early in April in a Belgian newspaper which printed a detailed account of the alleged method of extracting the oils and fats.

MORE VIOLENCE BY SINN FEINERS

CORK.—The Sinn Feiners were active here early this morning, when they smashed the windows in a number of recruiting offices, and by means of a fire escape hoisted the Republic flag on the Court House flagstaff and smashed the scales held by the figure of Justice over the Court House.

The Sinn Feiners at a big meeting this afternoon passed resolutions denouncing the national convention as a diplomatic attempt on the part of the Government to place Ireland in a false position and prevent the fulfilment of Ireland's claim to sovereign independence. The resolutions demanded that the executive convene the council to express the opinions of the people and elect representatives to a place conference.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years. Must reside six months in each of three years. Cultivate 40 acres and erect a house worth \$200. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation on certain conditions. W. W. LORY M.G.
