**THE FREDERIK VIII PUT BACK TO HALIFAX**

HALIFAX, Feb. 28—When ten miles out from Halifax last night, the steamer Frederik VIII, with Count Von Bernstorff and his official family aboard, turned about and came up as far as the examination boats. People along the shore, who were watching her exit from Halifax, got curious, and "phoned up" to the city.

It appears the wireless apparatus which was taken from the ship when she arrived at Halifax, had not been put aboard when she sailed last evening, and the discovery had not been made until the Frederik VIII was ten miles at sea, the captain of the ship, it is said, having received orders not to re-install the wireless until ten miles out from the port. The admiral, being informed of the situation, dispatched the wireless equipment and the steamer proceeded once more after a delay of a few hours.

Pilot Lamont Power took out the Frederik VIII when she first started, but left her when she turned about, his place being taken by Pilot Walter White, who took her to sea again.

Captain Jenson, formerly in charge of the steam trawler Triumph, now fishing out of Halifax, returned home on the Frederik VIII, having engaged passage from New York. He is a native of Iceland.

**Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations**

THIS sole head of a family on any date over 18 years of age, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.  
1. Title—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.  
2. In certain districts a quarter-section in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$5.00 per acre.  
3. Titles—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.  
4. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$500.  
The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

**MISCOUCHE FARMERS WANT AUTOMOBILES EVERY DAY IN WEEK**

At a meeting of the Miscouche Farmers' Institute which was held in their hall on February 23rd the auto question was very freely discussed by the members, the outcome of the meeting being a resolution asking that automobiles be permitted to run daily, instead of three times a week as at present. Coming as it does from an agricultural people, eager to keep abreast with the times it is hoped their request will be speedily granted.

**THE TRAGIC ARMENIANS**

Dr. William T. Ellis, writing in a Philadelphia weekly, says of that terribly persecuted people, the Armenians, whose cause was championed by the late William E. Gladstone: "The Armenians have always centered around Mt. Ararat. Their home has been since the earliest scripture mention of them, in the highlands and mountains from which flow the Tigris and Euphrates Rivers. The Armenians themselves claim this land as their birthplace. Their own name for their people is not 'Armenian' but 'Hait'; after the great grandson of Japheth, from whom they claim descent. Fifth in line from Noah, according to their own chronicles, they have maintained their identity to this day.  
"We are not left to the people's own records for testimony to their antiquity. In addition to frequent mention in the Old Testament, the famous rock inscriptions at Persepolis and Behistun, Persia, contain many allusions to Armenia. The cuneiform records at Van also attest the nation's antiquity and Herodotus deals with the Armenian nation. The king of Armenia was an ally of Cyrus the Great, and sixty years before Christ the Armenians were in league with Rome. In the meantime, Armenia had been conquered by Alexander the Great, and had later thrown off the Macedonian yoke. The oldest highways of conquest ran through the famous plateau where Russians and Turks are now struggling. It is no new experience for Armenia to be a battlefield.  
"This is not the place to rehearse Armenia's entire political history. The vicissitudes of her national life ended in Asia Minor in the fourteenth century, when she was allied with the Crusaders and, along with the king and Cypriotes, offered the last national bulwark of Christianity in the East. Enough has been written to make clear that the Armenians are an ancient people, with a proud past and worthy of the respect of mankind. Turkey's foul attempt to exterminate this people becomes doubly awful in the light of the heritage which they have brought down to us from remote times.  
"It was amidst persecution that Gregory, himself a prince of the blood royal, travelled to Armenia and won the ruling king to Christ, so that Christianity was proclaimed the state religion in the year 302. Gregory is known in church history as Gregory the Illuminator, and he became first now is called the Gregorian church, in honor of him.  
"The Armenian church participated in the third, fifth, sixth, and seventh Ecumenical Council, being kept from the fourth by the fires of persecution. A misunderstanding concerning the deliverance of the Council of Chalcedon respecting Nestorius led to a cleavage between the Armenian and the Greek churches, although both thoroughly Trinitarian and quite similar in organization and administration, as well as in doctrine."
