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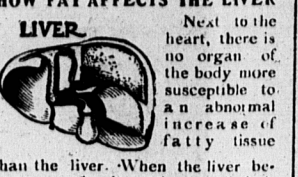
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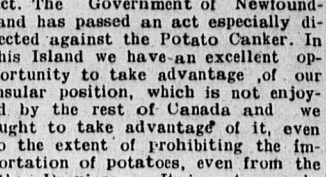

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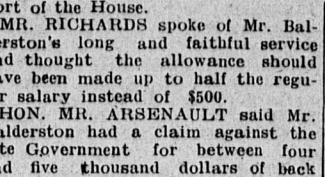

DANGERS OF FAT

Resolved, that in view of the prevalence in European countries and Newfoundland of a potato disease known as "Potato Canker" and the consequent danger of the same being introduced into this Province it is desirable that necessary and proper steps be taken to prevent the importation of potatoes from any of the infected countries without proper inspection. He supported the resolution in a brief address. He said:

"This year there are heavy imports of potatoes into Canada and the United States from Europe owing to last year's short crop. The disease known as the potato canker is spreading in England where it has been known for some years. It is spreading with alarming rapidity in Newfoundland, having been introduced into that Colony from Europe. It inevitably comes to Canada through the most energetic measures taken to prevent its introduction. It is very liable to come from Maine to New Brunswick. If it gets into this Island it will undoubtedly mean the ruin of our potato culture. There is no remedy yet known for it. The spores of the disease are carried in the field by infected seed, and thence infect the soil, and it takes at least six years to grow from Maine from the soil, during which potatoes cannot be grown. The disease may also be spread by the use of bags and other packages which have held diseased potatoes. Doubtless also it is carried by animals. Unlike the pest known as the Potato Scab, it renders the tubers unfit for human or animal food. The appearance of the disease is characteristic. The growth of the tubers show black excrescences about the eyes, and these excrescences enlarge until they occupy over more bulk than the potato itself. The colour is as black as peat, and the growth is of a spongy consistency. It spreads with amazing rapidity when once introduced into virgin fields. The most energetic measures are necessary immediately to cope with this most serious situation. An act has been passed in the federal Parliament to
