ROTARY

At the Rotary luncheon yesterday the speaker was Rotarian R. H. Rogers who gave an interesting and timely address on German Philosophy, which was the subject of the address of the German people.

He quoted from the writings of Fichte, Nietzsche, and others who had taught the doctrine of the Superman, that that is a vice which is normal disease, that might is right, that war is justified, morally and historically, &c. &c.

"I was told the speaker, in conclusion, 'we are fighting not only German tanks, submarines, mines, torpedoes, and bombs hurled from the skies, but against the rulers of the darkness of this world, against wickedness in high places. It may be that when we have won the war, (as I am sure we shall), the German people, having felt the rot of chastisement will be in a mood to listen to sinner councils.

The present madness of the German people is deeper rooted than many people realize, said the speaker. It is not a mere trend, but the writings of their greatest philosophers nearly two hundred years ago. Transcendental idealism which held that the individual is the most important thing but only the idea of the thing, a manifest of the will, makes oneself the centre and leads to the attitude of egotism, self conceit and the assertion of the individual as a god, only holy and universal spirit. A better age would come about only when the world would submit to the idea of brotherly recognition in the self consciousness of God. If a people were disciplined to obey the dictates of the state they must be forced to do so. Nietzsche explained the evolution brought about by the idea of the individual, which Nietzsche meant that pity, mercy, and all Christian teachings were signs of decadence, and he taught that the only way to the future was a race of supermen. 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
