THE WEATHER, THE TEMPERATURE, TIDE, MOON, ETC.

(Special to The Guardian.) TORONTO, March 6-Fair today with a little lower temperature; increasing northeasterly winds followed by snow or rain.

THE WEATHER.-The weather yesterday was mild and cloudy; becoming colder at night.

The highest temperature recorded yesterday was 35 degrees above zero and the lowest was 30 above, which record was registered at nine p. m. At nine a. m. it was 31 above. On the previous night the temperature registered 30 degrees at the lowest period.

The tide will be high this afternoon at 4.02 and tomorrow at 5.16; it rises tomorrow morning at 6.57 and Sunday at 8.10.

The sun sets this afternoon at 5.55 and tomorrow at 5.56; it rises tomorrow morning at 6.27 and Sunday at 6.25.

The moon sets tomorrow morning at 4.06.

The first quarter of the moon was on Thursday, March 5th at 1.03 a. m.

There will be a full moon on Thursday, March 12th at 12.18 a. m.

The length of today will be eleven hours and twenty-five minutes.

AFTER 21 YEARS FUNDS ARE CORRECT. CHICAGO, March 4.-The whereabouts of funds derived from the sale of souvenirs during the World's Fair in 1913, about which there has been much speculation here, was definitely established by Mrs. Potter Palmer, president of the board of lady managers of the World's Columbian Exposition.

The money which amounted to \$36,000 at the end of the fair was invested in securities and placed in a safe deposit box here. The fund has grown through interest until it amounts today to \$67,750. This fund is available at any time, Mrs. Potter said, to be consolidated with funds from the sale of Isabella coins and to be used in the work for which it was raised, the permanent betterment of women and children.

The question of the disposition of some of the World's Fair funds arose recently while Mrs. Palmer was in Florida. When word of the public discussion reached her she returned here determined to exact balance on hand and issued the final statement.
