IN SUMMERSIDE.—The Summerside Journal says that owing to the fact that the Summerside doctors are kept busy day and night, it is very difficult to get a reliable report on the influenza situation in Summerside. In this respect the Board of Health is working under great difficulties.

He suffered from gas attack and shell shock and was sent to the hospital and eventually sent back to Canada and entered the Dalton Sanatorium on September 9th. He died of tuberculosis on Oct 28th. He has a brother in France on active service. The funeral took place on the forenoon of Oct. 30th. Rev. J. Heaney conducted service and interment was made in North Wiltshire cemetery.

SUPREME COURT.—The November term of the Supreme Court (for arguments) opened in Charlottetown on Tuesday morning at 11 o'clock. His Lordship Chief Justice Matheson presiding associated with Mr. Justice Fitzgerald and Mr. Justice Haszard. The case of Major Schurman versus the Trustees and congregation of St. James' Presbyterian Church, which was tried a year ago in Summerside and in which a verdict was given in favor of the plaintiff, is now being argued, the defendants moving for a nonsuit or a new trial. The case was still before the court yesterday at adjournment at 2 o'clock. The Court meets this morning at 11 o'clock.

Christmas Remembrance for P.E.I. Artillery Overseas

The following is an extract from a letter received here from one of the original members of the 8th Canadian Siege Battery who is now in England qualifying for a commission: We had a swell old reunion shortly before 1 left, and to give you an idea of how many originals were left in the Battery, we practically all came away in one lorry. There were roughly about fifty or sixty men, about equally divided between the sections and we met back at Neuville St. Vaast a few miles behind Thelus and in front of Mt. St. Eloi. We all gathered underneath some shady trees on a grassy spot by the roadside, and after the usual handshaking and chatter (some in the different sections hadn't seen one another for a considerable time), we went on to speech-making, and then divided up the boxes of eats and magazines from the Auxiliary, which were greatly enjoyed. These were primarily responsible for the reunion, and all the pleasure in connection with it. If all you people who went to the expense and trouble of preparing them for us could have seen us on our little holiday and could realize what they brought to us, I believe you would have felt doubly rapid for your trouble.

Of the fifty or sixty above mentioned here are now left only between twenty five and thirty and these survivors, it is hoped, will enjoy a reunion about Christmas when the consignment of Christmas boxes now being packed will reach them. Who is there that would not want to have a part in contributing to the pleasure of such a reunion. The Artillery Auxiliary here are soliciting contributions to enable them to send a sufficient quantity of Christmas eats to serve all the Island Artillerymen "over there."
