Simon Francis, Maxwell Rear, is a brother and Mrs. Stephen Toney, Scotchfort is a sister. Barney Francis of Sackville, N. B., a former Prince Edward Island middle distance runner, and Jim P. Francis of Truro, N. S., are nephews of the deceased.

Powell, directors of the American College of Surgeons, who are native Canadians. The American College of Surgeons has now been in existence twenty-five years, and some remarkable evidence of the progress achieved in that period were given during the course of the meetings, which occasioned a great deal of public as well as professional interest.

EX-MARITIME DEAD AT ISLAY, ALTA. - Member of a prominent Maritime family, William Osgood Bill, died here recently. He was the son of Caleb R. Bill of Wolfville, N. S., and grandson of the late Hon. William C. Bill of Biltown, King's County, after whom he was named. Surviving are his widow, formerly Ethel E. Mayhew of Cornwall, Prince Edward Island; his mother three brothers and two sisters, J. Philip Bill and J. Emerson Bill, both of Ottawa; Dr. E. Gordon Bill, dean of Dalhousie University, Halifax; Mrs. H. Margaret wife of Lieut. Col. E. G. Shannon of London, Ont., and Ethelind, wife of Hon. P. P. Bligh of Halifax.

Searchers Sunday afternoon located the body of 20 year old Lester Rafuse, Georgetown, P. E. I. lobster fisherman, missing since last May 13, Royal Canadian Mounted Police said last night. Coroner Dr. J. Kennedy of Georgetown said no inquest would be necessary.

The body was found on the beach near the shore where his boat had drifted. Rafuse, in the midst of his first year as a fisherman and the only support of his widowed mother, Mrs. George Rafuse, left port to haul his traps and bring in the catch. Some time later his boat was discovered on Burnt Point beach with ignition still turned on and the gasoline supply exhausted. It was believed he had fallen overboard while the boat was in motion.
