KILLED IN ACTION

The following letter has been received by Miss Lillian McLeod, Summerside, on Tuesday, Aug. 20, 1918, from No. 712705, Pte. Frank A. Arsenault, of the 28th Canadian Battalion, who is reported killed in action.

Somewhere in France, Aug. 7, 1918.

Dear Lillian,—Received your most welcome letter and was very glad to hear from you again. Lillian, I intended writing before this but there is nothing to write about. It always is the same.

Well, Lil, we are having very fine

weather here now. I am not in the line now, and we are not working very hard, but having a pretty good time. I must tell you we got a draft of boys from the 104th Battalion, and there are a lot of the old 106th boys in it that I know.

The passes are coming very slowly now, only one or two a week, but my turn is coming. I will be getting mine soon. I see your brother Fred every day, but I have not seen Alyne for some time. I do not know where he is at present.

I am thinking of going to the flying corps this summer. If I get a transfer I will let you know. I am glad to say we have some hope of getting back to old Canada, and proud to say the Allies are doing some good work all along the line.

Well, Lil, I will have to stop scribbling tonight and go to bed.

FOX INDUSTRY AND FOX TAX

Sir,—I could not attend the Fox Breeders Meeting that was held in Charlottetown a short time ago and so I write to know what was done at that meeting and also for some information about the paying of the fox tax. I have been ranching Silver and Cross foxes on my own account since 1913 and paid all the taxes demanded from me except the tax for 1916 and I would have paid that too only I was told by people that ought to know that a great many companies and ranchers were behind in their taxes and that some of them never paid any tax at all and that I was foolish for paying mine every year when other people could keep theirs in their pockets. Now last week I got a bill from the Government for my 1916 tax and a notice that if I didn't pay it before the 27th of this month I would be sued for it. So I don't know what is best for me to do. My Silver Foxes are taxed \$5 a piece and the few crosses I have 50 cents a piece. Its more than I could sell them for but I don't think it is much out of the way for good foxes and so I don't object to paying the tax on that account. But I object to paying any more tax unless the big companies and ranchers are made pay up their tax and every rancher big or small be treated alike. All the small ranchers I talked to about the tax are of same opinion as I am so if the big companies and ranchers are made pay the same as the small ones everybody will be satisfied. I never had to be sued to pay my debt and I don't want to be brought to court now for my fox tax and this is why I want to know if the Government intend to make every company and ranchers pay their tax or only collect from them that are willing to pay and let the others keep their taxes in their pockets. I hear that the foxmen at their meeting passed a resolution asking the Government to put a tax of \$5 a piece on all foxes on the island and would like to know if that is true. I will be much obliged for any information you can give me about the tax and for your advice in the matter. You must excuse this letter as it is the first I ever wrote for a newspaper but I hope that some one that understands the fox business and the tax will take it up and explain it in the newspapers for the benefit of ranchers like myself.
