

Late Market News

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, Ont., Jan. 29.—(Eggs)—Reports from various egg markets indicate that the general tone of the situation is continuing weak and some further price declines have taken place. TORONTO, Ont., Jan. 29.—The market is steady here today. Dealers are quoting country shippers for ungraded eggs delivered extras 47; firsts 44; pullet extras 41, seconds 34. Receipts are showing a slight decline. MONTREAL, Que., Jan. 29.—Egg receipts here today were 975 cases as compared to 2,840 cases a year ago. This market is easy and unsettled with some accumulations of stock. Fresh eggs are fobbing on spot at extras 49-50; firsts 47-48; pullet extras 43-55. For ungraded shipments dealers are quoting extras 48; firsts 45; pullet extras 43; seconds 36. Prices of fresh eggs to retailers are extras 52-54; firsts 50-52; pullet extras 48-49. HALIFAX, N. S., Jan. 29.—Paying prices on this egg market are lower, but there is no change reported in wholesale levels dealers are paying country shippers delivered extras 45-58; firsts 40-42; seconds 20-32. Chicago spot 35 1-2 Feb. 28, 1-4 Nov. refrigerator 30 1-3. MONTREAL, Que., Jan. 29.—Lack of the arrival of further supplies of New Zealand butter in large quantities which arrival was expected by local dealers, tended to stem the decline on the local butter market today a generally firm tone prevailed which did not substantiate yesterday's weakness. Quotations were from 36 3-4 to 36 cents a pound, although old lots went at 35 1-2 cents for the best varieties. Retail prices continued at 39 and 40 cents a pound. Wholesalers reported no change in the egg market with the supply of fresh eggs adequate for the demand. The poultry market continued to exhibit a firm tone. A slightly improved tone was noted in the potato market although there were no price changes. New Brunswick Green Mountains held at \$1.80 to \$1.85 and Quebec's from \$1.75 to \$1.80 per 90 pound; in car lots ex track here.

(Continued from page 1) gested it to His Honour. The latter took up the idea and the presentation is the result. Governor Hertz has given trophies for a similar purpose to schools. Mr. Lea himself had the pleasure of making the presentation at Launching, in eastern Kings, where the farmers exhibited the greatest enthusiasm in the matter. Cups are presented to only three individuals although more than thirty have competed. The person winning the prizes each year keeps them. Mr. Jas. Dennis who was present, expressed his appreciation for the trophy. The same was also voiced by Mr. D. J. Stewart, who expressed the idea that carefully tended farms are monuments of industry. Mr. H. H. Shaw, Superintendent of Education, was called upon to receive the cup for Mrs. Pursey. After expressing his thanks on behalf of the recipient Mr. Shaw stated that five or six years ago the Horticulture Department of Canada offered to provide a cup for the school making the greatest improvement in its grounds. His Honour conferred a cup for the whole island, the trophy being won by the school in Hampshire, formerly a very poor school. A new school was built after much opposition, and the school went on improving and finally won the cup. Recently Mr. Shaw stated that he said at the Red Cross meeting that he visited fifty schools, and that from his observations he thought that the schools had improved more in the last ten years than they had in the time preceding since the enactment of the school act. The touch of the woman at home and abroad undoubtedly accounts for those improvements. In concluding Mr. Shaw made the appeal that parents, lost no opportunity to educate their children, for in education lies the problem which five nations are now attempting to solve. His Honour stated that Mr. Shaw has carried out the peculiarities for which he is noted in "cherchez la femme." It was through the Minister of Agriculture that the scheme originated. It is gratifying to note that increasing interest is being taken in the movement. It is the touch of the ladies that has brought out the results. Four or five years ago the idea was conceived of inviting the ladies of the Women's Institute to Edgewater. If the men had such an organization they would be much better. OPERATION COSTS

Reviewing the work of the organization for Mr. Booth, of Toronto, Mr. Boulter, continued, the expenses were found surprisingly small. The running expenses were less than one percent of the turn over. In all my experience," Mr. Booth was quoted as saying, "I have never seen anything like it." If there was anything loose or shipshod in the work of the Association the organization would not have such a record. The work is most enjoyable although extremely trying on the nerves. The association does not run by chance. Do not let any person say that this business is not conducted in a business-like way. Three very interesting and educational lectures were delivered at the evening session by Mr. John Tucker of the seed certification department. Mr. R. R. Hurst, provincial pathologist, and Mr. S. G. Peppin, Chief Potato Inspector. Mr. Tucker who was the first speaker gave a very interesting account of the work of the certification department. The Dominion plant pathologist outlined briefly the work at the Experimental farm laboratory since coming to the Island in 1924. The speaker stated, he has been in connection with the inspectors who deserve great credit for their work. The inspectors, who have been trained at the laboratory are capable of recognizing any disease of either plant or tuber. In 1918 Dr. Paul Murphy organized the laboratory and to him great credit is due for the principles which he laid down. Spraying of potatoes to control late blight was introduced by Mr. Murphy in 1918, and has proved very practical. The laboratory is essentially a potato laboratory, and the problems of potatoes are the ones dealt with. Recently a substitute for Borgess' Mixture, well recommended, has been introduced. Dust has not proven as satisfactory as could be hoped, though it is the ideal fungicide for late blight. It takes years to establish dependable results from any compound! A few years ago an agent for a chemical disinfectant visited the province. His compound has since proven not to have come up to expectations, and it was fortunate that the chemical was not recommended. Bichloride of Mercury has proven an excellent disinfectant. Late blight tests are in progress frequently at the laboratory. Plants some resistant to blight, others having many desirable qualities, present the problem of crossing types. Attempts have been made to secure an entomologist to look into the possibilities of combating mosaic through control of aphids. Such an official may be procurable, and the possibility has been encouraged. Green Mountains could be grown much better if this disease were controlled. The destructive insect and pest does not permit the sale of the product without the official tag attached. The term "Canada No. 1" is often mistaken for "certified seed." A change in name is opposed in New Brunswick. The department will be directed by the desires of the growers in this matter. A small hoe potato is now in demand especially in British Columbia as the other seed rots in the ground. If this seed is provided there should be no confusion with table stock. Small seed, however, are very often the diseased ones, and therefore the above is not to be recommended. A tag, provided it meets with approval, could be issued but only for table stock; in no case for foundation stock. The possibility of shipping more products under this caption is an objection. Canadian Trade Commissioners boost Canadian products, particularly in South America. South Africa consumes large amounts of small potatoes. The latest request for seed has come from Mexico, where, it is suggested, there is a good market. Answering a question of a member Mr. Tucker stated that potatoes which are not certified must be inspected two years in succession before being certified. This has never yet been done. Although eighty per cent of the local applications pass the certified test, the highest percentage in Canada without the inspection there would be only one-tenth of the potatoes pass the present test within a few years. Despite all attempts at betterment the average of the potato production per acre has not increased. The policy should be to increase the yield per acre rather than increase the acreage. The yield produced above the average is the profit. Quality must be watched in deal-
