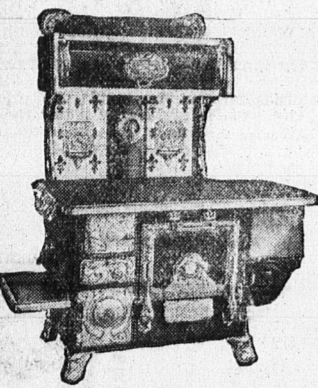

KAISER MORTIFIED AT INVASION OF BELGIUM

LONDON, Sept. 3.—The Daily News says a copy has been received of the new Grey Books issued a few weeks ago by the Belgian Government, containing supplementary despatches dealing with the diplomatic crisis preceding the war. "A most interesting document," says The Daily News, "is a despatch dated August 4, 1914, from Baron Beyens, the Belgian Minister at Berlin, giving a summary of a dramatic conversation he had on that day with Herr von Jagow, the German Foreign Secretary, relating to the German demand for leave of passage through Belgium. Herr von Jagow said: "We have been compelled by absolute necessity to make upon your Government this demand. It is for Germany a question of life and death. In order that she may not be crushed, she must herself first crush France, and then turn against Russia."

"We have been informed that a French army is preparing to pass through Belgium in order to attack us on our flank. We are bound to prevent such an attack. If the Belgian Army does not blow up bridges and allow us to occupy Leige and itself retires to Antwerp, we promise not only to respect Belgian independence and the life and property of the inhabitants, but also to pay you indemnity. "It is with a feeling of extreme mortification (la mort dans lame—the death in the soul) that the Kaiser and his Government have been obliged to take this decision. To myself it is the most painful step that I have ever taken in all my career. "Baron Beyens' reply was: 'What would you say if we were to yield to a similar menace on the part of France? You would say that we were cowards, incapable of defending our neutrality and of leading an independent life. By way of acknowledgement."

GERMAN MOBILIZATION IS CALLED A BLUFF

LONDON, Sept. 3.—The Daily Chronicle's diplomatic correspondent says: "It would be only fulfilling the malicious intentions of the central powers to accept the present military demonstration on the frontiers of Serbia and Rumania at its face value. Its purpose in the most favorable circumstances must be more political than military. The expense of the suggested German plan to break through Serbia and Bulgaria to Constantinople even if it proved successful, which is decidedly improbable would be out of all proportion to the military value of the achievement. Any fresh attack on Serbia will certainly recreate the Balkan League, and such a contingency—bringing into action against the Teutonic powers over 1,250,000 men—German diplomacy cannot possibly contemplate."

It seems most likely, as a reliable authority points out, that the latest military move on the part of Austria and Germany is intended doubly as a sinister support of the political projects their agents are assiduously advancing in Sofia and as a further menace to Rumania. Meanwhile the last-formed source, it steadily rejecting alternately coercive and conciliatory advances made by Germany concerning the transport of munitions to Turkey. The Rumanian army, which would certainly co-operate with the other Balkan States in resisting the German invasion of Serbia and Bulgaria, numbers nearly 600,000 men, and may be relied upon to render a vigorous account of itself."

GERMAN EMPEROR CONFERS BLACK EAGLE

BERLIN, Sept. 3.—Emperor William conferred upon Field Marshal Von Mackenzen the order of the Black Eagle, the highest decoration within the Emperor's gift.

FRENCH USING NEW POWERFUL BOMB.

PARIS, Sept. 6.—A well-known aviator describes how a sixty year old professor of science joined the war service as a sub-lieutenant to try out a new liquid bomb he had just invented. A member of the Academy of Science and an officer of the Legion of Honor, the professor offered his bomb free on condition that he be allowed to direct the first military trial. But, as the regulations forbid any save a member of the armie taking war flights, he promptly volunteered and received a commission. He took the observer's seat in a biplane during operations near Hebuterne, and accurately dropped a bomb weighing a hundred pounds on a chateau, the local German headquarters. When the smoke cleared away they saw the chateau had been practically demolished. The airman asserts that the bomb is tenfold more destructive than the same weight in dynamite. The professor is now directing the manufacture of these bombs, which have contributed largely to the successes in the recent raids by French airmen.

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RUSSIA'S PEASANTS WAR AGAINST THE GERMANS.
PARIS, Sept. 6.—Not only in Poland but in Russia proper the peasants have organized a deadly guerrilla warfare against the Germans, according to a correspondent of France Desdemain.
Their activity closely resembles that which was so important a factor in the destruction of Napoleon's Grand Arme in 1812. The Germans are continually harassed, their supply trains intercepted, and railway lines connecting their bases are torn up.
They seek to avenge themselves on women and children, but to prevent this the peasants are systematically evacuating the villages and hamlets, and are devastating the country in all directions in front and on the flanks of the advancing columns.
The correspondent further says that Russian military agents have discovered a clandestine supply depot for German submarines at Riga. It was installed in a factory owned by an important company, one director of which was a German. A large quantity of gasoline and alcohol was confiscated.

TURKS BURNED TOWN AND MASSACRED THE INHABITANTS

LONDON, Sept. 3.—A despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company from Athens says: "Travellers arriving from Constantinople announce that on Friday last Turks burned the town of Ismid, and massacred a large number of the Armenian inhabitants. Ismid lies at the head of the Gulf of Ismid, in Asia Minor, about 56 miles southeast of Constantinople. It has been the residence of both Greek and Armenian Archbishops. Its population is about 25,000."
