IMPORTANT CONFERENCE.—Mr. J. B. McCurry returned Monday night from Washington and Philadelphia where he represented the Dominion Department of Agriculture at the International Conference of Phytopathologists held under the auspices of the Advisory Board of the American Plant Pathologists. There were representatives from Canada, the various States of the Union, Australia, South Africa, Japan, Czecho Slovakia, Argentina, Mexico and the Philippine Islands, between 75 and 100 in all. Extensive tours were made through the States, Delaware, New Jersey and Pennsylvania, where numerous experiments looking to the control of the various diseases of crops were observed.

Campbell of Quibby, Mass; Mrs. Harry Campbell of Elmwood; Mrs. John Donoherty of Kingston; Myles of Darlington and Donald and Florence at home. There also survives five brothers Wm. McDonald of Buffalo, N. Y.; Myles of British Columbia; Malcolm of Berwick, N. S.; John of O'Leary and J. Y. McDonald of Charlottetown and one sister Mrs. Moore of Somerville, Mass.

### Wilhelm Abandons Marriage Project

BERLIN, Sept. 12.—In royalist circles here great relief is observed regarding the reported engagement of ex-Kaiser Wilhelm to Princess Hermione of Reuss (elder line), but I learn on high authority that it is now unlikely that such a marriage will take place. What has happened is as follows:

Since the death of the ex-Kaiser in the royal and imperial exile has, I am told, felt "desperately lonely." There is little or no congenial society for him, and as Doroa Castle has no mistress, thing, do not go on smoothly and comfortably at times. Princess Hermione, who is as charming and accomplished woman or little more than half the ex-Kaiser's age, has been a guest at Doorn on several occasions and the lonely exile was so much attracted by her that betrothal and marriage were in the end discussed.

When the first whisper of this reached monarchist circles in Berlin and Potsdam, however, several influential personages departed post haste for Doorn to persuade the ex-Kaiser not to marry the Princess. The ex-Crown Prince was appealed to and he, too, went to Doorn to endeavor to prevent matters from going any further.

The main objections are that the Princess is not of equal birth with the ex-Kaiser, and that she has a family of five children. Such a marriage, the ex-Kaiser has been told by his closest friends and advisers, would not be looked on by royalists as a suitable one, and it would undoubtedly endanger his and the monarchist cause.

As a result of the very strong representations of his eldest son, and his friends the ex-Kaiser gave way and said that he abandoned his intention to marry. It is feared, however, that once his advisers leave and he feels lonely again, the project will be revived and he will carry it through in his well known impetuous way.

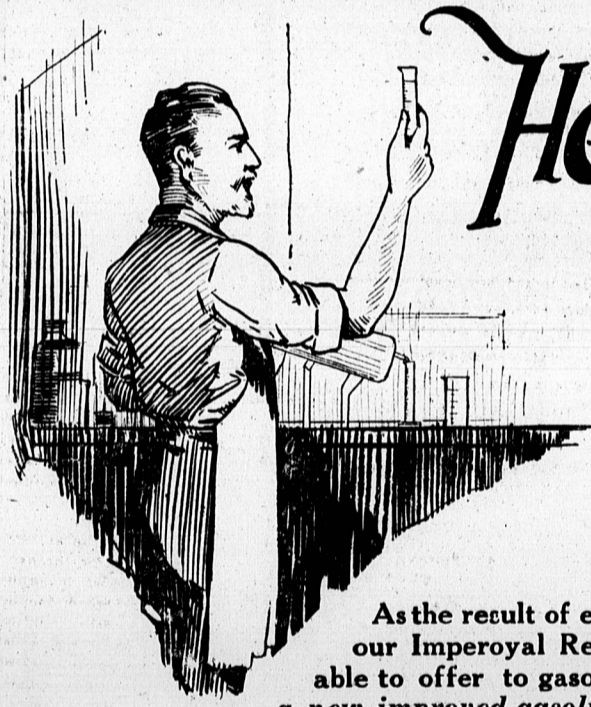
Princess Hermione is not, as has been stated a war widow. Her husband died in April, 1920. She has a sister who is active on the literary side of the cinema industry.

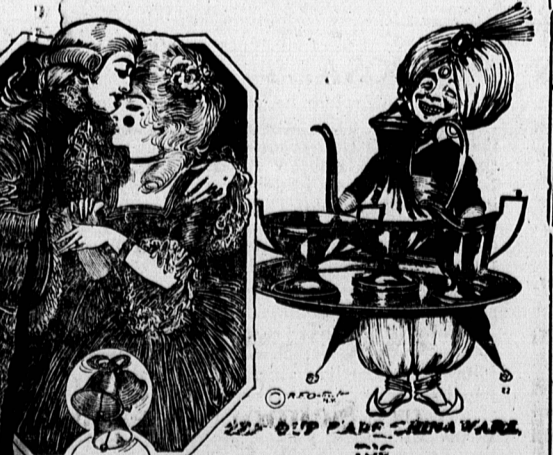
