**Dominion-Provincial Youth
Training Programme**

Under the provisions of a grant for Employment of Unemployed Youth, arrangements have been made for Short Training Courses, as outlined below. Students making application for attendance at these Courses must be in unemployed circumstances, although not necessarily on relief, and be from 18 to 32 years of age. Transportation and board and lodging costs will be provided under the policy.
