Germany's Black Day

August 8th, 1918, was the black day of Germany in the History of the War. So says, Lutendorf in his "Prologa".
In its official report of that crushing defeat before Amiens to the German arms, the German General Staff said: "We were up against the elite of the French Army and the celebrated Canadian Corps."
The battle of Amiens, which first broke the enemy line on the West Front, was structurally and tactically a Canadian Corps battle. How great was its part is brought out by Mr. Livesay in his book, "Canada's Hundred Days."

Hundred Days' about to be published by Thomas Allen, of Toronto. The author was present throughout these operations as correspondent for the Canadian Press.

"The breaking of the Hindenburg Line at Cambrai" says the London Times War Correspondent, "was the biggest and most decisive victory that a British Army ever won on the Continent since Cressy."
This great Victory, which finally crushed enemy hopes of re-establishing a static defensive on the West Front was almost entirely a Canadian Corps battle. This is clearly brought out by Mr. Livesay in his book, "Canada's Hundred Days," which gives a faithful and at the same time intimate account of these operations. The book will be shortly published by Thomas Allen, of Toronto.

"There is no finer Corps in Europe than the Canadian Corps" said the King of the Belgians the heroic soldier, at Mons just after the armistice.
Why this was so is shown by Mr. Livesay in his forthcoming book, "Canada's Hundred Days."

INVESTIGATE FLAG INCIDENT

RUTLAND, Dec. 4.—Testimony regarding an alleged insult to the American flag by Miss Annie McLane, a Canadian nurse at the Rutland Hospital, was heard today by an ad hoc committee appointed to investigate the incident, for which an annual appropriation is made by the city. Miss Josephine Niles, a nurse, testified that when she showed Miss McLane a postcard bearing a picture in which the American flag was shown Miss McLane remarked: "That would be a pretty picture if it were not for that dirty red, white and blue flag."
After Miss McLane had refused to make an apology, which the witness demanded, Miss Niles said she and several other nurses went to the Canadian young woman's room with an American flag and insisted that she salute it. She refused and the nurses reported the affair to the hospital superintendent, Miss Annie Aitken.
Miss Aitken, according to the testimony of Miss Niles and other nurses, would not accede to their request that she make Miss McLane apologize, but instead reprimanded them for going

to the nurse's room and told them she would deprive them of their next Sunday's leisure hour. Thereupon the nurses declared a strike. After they had remained away from duty one night they returned upon being informed by the Superintendent that Miss McLane would apologize and would leave the hospital.
Three nurses testified that, so far as they knew, Miss McLane never has made an apology. They said she left the hospital shortly afterward, returning to her home in Canada, and although she had not completed her term of training the Superintendent gave her a diploma.
Several nurses testified that they were reprimanded by the superintendent for taking an American flag to the table where Miss McLane was eating. The committee will hold another hearing tomorrow. A self-constituted committee of citizens went to the hospital tonight and conducted a secret hearing.

TO CONSIDER CASE OF REV. SALEM BLAND

TORONTO, Dec. 1.—Friction between some members of the quarterly official board of Broadway Methodist Tabernacle, of this city, and the pastor, Rev. Dr. Salem Bland, has been developing since last summer, and matters are expected to come to a head tonight at a meeting to be presided over by the president of the district, Rev. J. J. Ferguson.

Dr. Bland's salary has not been paid since last July. It is stated that the trouble might be patched up so as to permit Dr. Bland to remain at Broadway Tabernacle until next June, when the stationing committee of the conference may find another pastorate for him.
The trouble was the outcome of several remarks Dr. Bland was alleged to have made at a meeting in Queen's Park in connection with the Winnipeg strike, the remarks in question savoring of extreme views on the labor question, according to the opinions of those officials of his church who took issue with him.

RACE TRACK REPORT

SOON TO BE MADE

OTTAWA, Dec. 3.—Hon. F. B. Carvell and the other members of the Railway Board who have been holding a number of sittings in the Western provinces will be back in the capital before the end of the week.
On the return of the commissioners, Dr. J. G. Rutherford, who was the commissioner named to inquire into the matter of race track betting in Canada, will probably hold a few additional sittings in Eastern Canada, after which he will draft his report in time for it to be submitted to parliament in February.
Dr. Rutherford will also, as early a date as possible, fix the time for the sittings of the commission named by the government, some months ago, to inquire into the possibilities of the far northern regions of Canada as wool and food producing areas by the domestication of reindeer, caribou and muskox. He is also the chairman of this commission, and in view of his other activities and the difficulty of inducing witnesses to

come to Ottawa during the holiday season, it may be some time in January before the inquiry opens.
