Beatty Resigns Chancellorship of Queen's University

Beatty, President of the Canadian Pacific Railway as Chancellor of the University. Mr. Beatty expressed regret in asking that his resignation be accepted because he found it impossible to fill the responsibilities of office owing to rush of other work.

Captives of Chinese Bandits Suffer Privation

(Canadian Press.) SHANGHAI, May 9.—Fourteen foreigners, including several British citizens, held in the hills back of Lincheng by the Suichow train bandits, are almost dead from exposure, and lack of food and clothing, according to a message received here today.

War on Summer Furs to Save Wild Animals

(Canadian Press.) NEW YORK, May 9.—War is declared against the fashion of summer furs, which is expected to reach the peak of popularity this summer, in a circular issued by the American Blue Cross Society, with headquarters in Springfield, Mass. The purpose of the campaign is to check the slaughter of fur-bearing animals, which threatens total extinction of the wild animals if the craze maintains its present pace, says the society.

Recommend Increase of British Air Force

(Canadian Press.) LONDON, May 9.—The Cabinet has reached the conclusion that a considerable increase in British air forces is necessary, the Duke of Devonshire informed the House of Lords today.

Mr. A. E. Dewar Presents Claims of P.E.I. Potato Growers

(Canadian Press.) OTTAWA, May 8.—Potato growers and shippers from Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick placed their views before the special agricultural committee of the House this morning. Alfred E. Dewar, President of the Prince Edward Island potato growers' association, was examined as to production costs on the island, and also the operation of the co-operative buying organization of the growers' association.

A last Message From Ship Lost in 1918

Canada's Trade With U.S. Increases

(Canadian Press.) OTTAWA, May 9.—Canada's trade with the United States both import and export for the year ending March 31, shows considerable increase over the preceding year. Total imports amounted to \$540,917,432, against \$515,958,196. Total exports were \$380,347,721, against \$304,104,177 last year.

BRITAIN GIVES RUSSIAN SOVIET TEN DAYS IN WHICH TO FORWARD REPLY

(Canadian Press.) LONDON, May 9.—The British note to the Russia Soviet Government, the text of which was issued tonight by the Foreign Office, is a virtual ultimatum. The Soviet is given ten days in which to forward a reply, complying fully and unconditionally with certain specified demands, failing which, the note says, Great Britain will recognize that the Soviet does not wish to maintain the existing relations between the two Governments. The demand specified in the note, are, first, satisfactory assurances concerning the Soviet of liability for various offenses against British subjects and ships, with an undertaking to pay compensation for these offenses, and third, unequivocal withdrawal of the two communications framed by the Soviet Government in reply to the protests handed to the Moscow Foreign Office by the British representative, Robert M. Hodgson, in connection with the religious persecutions.

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Predicts Coal And Iron Mining Five Miles At Sea

SYDNEY, N. S., May 9.—Engineers in time will be able to take coal and iron ore from under the sea at distances of five miles or more from shore, according to S. W. Gray, an executive of the British Empire Steel Corporation. Workings already extend two and a quarter miles to sea at Sydney mines, and 70 per cent of the coal produced in Nova Scotia comes from beneath the ocean.

French Pass Death Sentence on German

Smaller Rooms Reduce Demand For Carpets

BERLIN, May 9.—As Germans moved into smaller living quarters because of high rentals, the need for floor coverings declined proportionately. At the same time prices continued high on account of the heavy import duties on raw materials, and out of both these conditions there resulted a buyers' strike. People dispensed with new carpets, or got along with what they had before.

Pope Receives King and Queen

(Canadian Press.) ROME, May 9.—Pope Pius received King George and Queen Mary in the apostolic palace of the Vatican at eleven o'clock this morning, with all the pomp and honors accorded royal visitors to the papal court.

Leper no Longer Fear Segregation In Colony

MANILA, May 9.—The leper of the Philippines no longer object to being sent to the island of Culion where 5,000 persons afflicted with the disease are under treatment, according to Dr. Regino G. Padua, of the bureau of health. Dr. Padua has just returned to Manila from an inspection of conditions in more than half the provinces of the islands. During his trip he collected 271 lepers from various parts of the archipelago, all of whom he sent to the colony on Culion Island.

Steamer Service on the Magdalen Route

The following telegram was sent yesterday to the Prime Minister by Mr. J. A. Messervy: Hon. W. L. McKenzie King, Prime Minister, Ottawa. Received the following telegram dated 26th April from Deputy Minister of Marine: "Steamer Stanley at present blocked up in Bras d'Or lakes account of heavy ice. If after liberation, regular sailings to Magdalen Islands not commenced, arrangements will be made to send Stanley and to care for any emergency that may arise." Steamer Stanley can now proceed to Pictou and operate this service: Large amount of freight accumulated at Pictou, N. S., and Souris, P. E. I., for Magdalen Islands. The regular subsidized steamer cannot be on the route till middle of July. Kindly instruct Marine Department to issue immediate instructions to have steamer Stanley proceed at once to Pictou to relieve serious conditions in Magdalen Islands, carrying supplies, allowing inhabitants to prepare for spring fishing.
