The oldest man in Summerside is Mr. James B. Leard. Born on November the 12th 1803 he is now in his 93rd year. He first saw the light of this world in Tryon where his father the late John Leard was also born and lived to the ripe old age of over 91 years. Mr. Leard's brothers all lived to be over the allotted span. Samuel lived to be 86, William 82 and John 79, while a sister, Mrs. William Lea, reached her 84th year; another sister Mrs. William Howatt is still living and is over 80 years of age. Thus our respected citizen, Mr. James B. Leard, enjoys being the longest lived of a long-lived family. When he was yet a young man his father gave him 70 acres of unbroken land, and settling down to hard toil he built thereon a log house in size 33 x 26 ft. At the age of 22 he married Margaret McWilliams who was then 18 years old. It was a big undertaking to go to work single handed in a forest like country, but with his good wife to attend to the domestic affairs and with an easy and contented mind of his own, strong arms and robust constitution, his struggles were not in vain. In course of time he stretched forth into a broader business and besides attending to his farm duties he started a carding mill and also a brick yard. These industries soon became a source of revenue and to-day, as for the past twenty-five years since he came to Summerside, he is an independent man. Mr. Leard in conversation with THE GUARDIAN representative said that he has never worried, he always enjoyed the best of health and knows very little about illness. These facts are evidenced on his face, for one sees there every sign of a healthful and well preserved body. Few men twenty five years his junior show as few lines as mark his brow; an in his old days, though of course grey haired, he would pass for a man of 75 years. One remarkable feature, one of which it would be hard to find a duplicate, is that he yet retains his full sets of teeth and has never given the dentists the chance to make a dollar on him. With these he enjoys three hearty meals each day, which he never misses and knows nothing about a disordered stomach. Our noteworthy citizen has three sons and one daughter living: Mr. Stephen Leard residing at Tryon, Messrs. William and Joseph in the United States and Mrs. Josiah Howatt now in Denver, Colorado. The latter is the second wife of Mr. Howatt, who married sisters: the first wife now deceased, being the mother of Mrs. J. A. Brace of this town with whom Mr. Leard resides. Up to the present winter Mr. Leard has been able to take his daily walk about the town, and had all his faculties as in younger days; but now his old age is bearing heavily upon this mortal frame and though able to walk about the house he does not venture out. His hearing is getting quite dull and his memory is failing, yet not to any great extent considering his age, and he has every appearance of living for a few more years at least.
