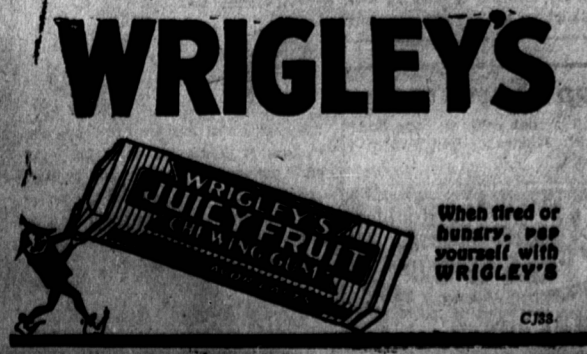

EGG LAYING CONTEST

Notes on the Prince Edward Island Egg Laying Contest for the Week Ending Sept. 11, 1928. Mr. H. C. Muttart's B.R. pen 12 led the contest for the week with 49 eggs, 85.2 points; the Experimental Farm, Charlottetown, B.R. pen 15, were second with 45 eggs, 52.9 points, and their pen 16 were third with 43 eggs, 52.5 points.

The Experimental Farm, Fredericton, N.B., B.R. hen No. 10 still leads in individual laying with 249 eggs, 290.4 points; Mr. S. R. Pendleton's B.R. hen No. 6 is second with 258 eggs, 285.5 points, and the Experimental Farm, Fredericton, N.B., hen No. 3 is third with 236 eggs, 284.5 points.

The Experimental Farm, Fredericton, N.B., B.R. pen No. 6 leads the contest with 2081 eggs, 2306.7 points; Mr. S. R. Pendleton's B.R. pen 16 is very close with 2083 eggs, 2304.8 points, and Mrs. J. E. McPhall's B.R. pen 30

is third with 2096 eggs, 2279.4 points; the Experimental Farm, Charlottetown, B.R. pen 15 is fourth with 1997 eggs, 2128 points. The total number of eggs laid for the week was 638, and to date 35,066.
