THE FOLLOWING WAS INADVERTENTLY OMITTED FROM YESTERDAY'S ISSUE

OTTAWA, Nov. 30.—The first division in Parliament on the reply to the address showed a Conservative majority of 44. Mr. Blondin was appointed Deputy Speaker. The Senate discussed the pollution of streams, the weight of a loaf of bread and other subjects. Valuable information was adduced dealing with Canada's exceptionally high infant mortality. One quarter of the babies born, die within the first year and the Senate urged Government action regarding hygiene and the manufacture of soothing syrups.

BIG OIL TRUST LOSES CONTROL. NEW YORK, Dec. 1.—The career of the Oil Trust ended yesterday when the Standard Oil Co. of New Jersey, relinquished control of its subsidiary companies. These latter, today began as Independent concerns.

DANGEROUS, PERHAPS FATAL ACCIDENT. ST. JOHN, Dec. 1.—Mrs. Andrew Jack, a well known banker, was dangerously and probably fatally hurt last night. She was struck by a carriage in which Mrs. Anglin and Mrs. Traverse were driving. The horse had taken fright at a locomotive.

DRASTIC ORDER BY HIS HOLINESS. ROME, Dec. 1.—Pope Pius has issued a drastic order relating to persons who bring ecclesiastical matters before the lay courts. His edict declares that any person who, without permission of Ecclesiastical authority, summons before a lay court either Civil or Criminal, any ecclesiastical person will incur excommunication.

NEW MOVEMENT IN THE CELESTIAL KINGDOM. PEKING, Dec. 2.—There has been a significant movement of troops here during the past few days—the Manchus departing and the Chinese arriving. Many prominent persons look upon this as part of Premier Yuan Shi Kai's plan to secure supreme power for himself by seizing the Regency as the first step towards the throne.

CLOSURE APPLIED TO 500 AMENDMENTS. LONDON, Dec 1.—The Government last night, applied closure to nearly 500 Amendments to the Insurance bill. The Opposition members headed by Bonar Law, left the Chamber when the first division was called. They were followed by derisive Ministerial cheers. The amendments were then rushed through.

THE KING AND QUEEN HAVE ROUGH PASSAGE. LONDON, Dec 1.—Reports from the Steamship Medina indicate that the King and Queen had an extremely rough passage through the Bay of Biscay. A portion of the Queen's apartments were flooded and the Queen was forced to occupy a special stateroom cabin with a swinging cot. The escorting warships suffered severely.

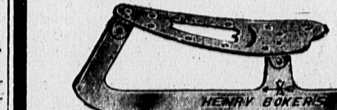

DIES UNDER TRAIN TO SAVE A GIRL.

CHICAGO, Nov. 29.—Though he came to Chicago from his Nebraska farm home only a few days ago hoping to win fame and fortune, Ernest Weekly, 24 years old, unhesitatingly sacrificed his life last night to save that of a little girl in danger of being run down by a speeding express train. While the young man from the country dashed to the rescue scores of city dwellers stood by and looked on helplessly.

Weekly got a place with an insurance company almost immediately after coming here from Valley, Neb., and he was returning to his boarding place after a day's work when he lost his life. He had just stepped from a suburban train at Fifty-ninth street when he heard men yelling and women screaming, and looking about he saw the little girl standing directly in the path of the onrushing engine.

He bounded across three tracks, crying "Lookout, girls, you'll be hurt," but the child was too frightened to move. The train was less than a dozen yards away when Weekly reached the girl, and, stopping, grasped her with his arms and hurled her to one side of the track. Just as he started to leap after to safety Weekly stumbled on a spike projecting from a tie and fell across the track as the engine struck him. The crowd on the station platform had been watching the girl, and when next eyes were turned toward the man who has rushed to her rescue, his body has been crushed beneath the wheels.

GOTCH OFFERS TO DEFEND TITLE AGAINST BRITISH CHAMPION. KANSAS CITY, November 29.—Frank Gotch, the world's heavyweight wrestling champion, has offered to meet Alec Munroe, the English wrestler, in Convention hall, Kansas City, and the officials of the Missouri Athletic club this afternoon cabled the Englishman an offer for a match on December 28, winner to receive 25 per cent of the purse.

Gotch, in a letter received today, offered to meet Munroe at any time before January 5, before he starts on his trip to Europe. "I will not meet Munroe in England. If he wants his match he must come to America. I would prefer to have the match the last week in December. If this match is arranged it will be my last championship for about a year, and perhaps for ever. I will engage only in exhibition matches while abroad."
