with Mr. McGougan in a few days.

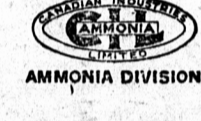
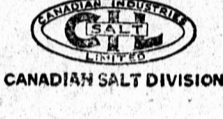
—Mrs. Wilkie of Alberton was the
