MONUMENT MEMORIAL

Presented to the Provincial Government

WEDNESDAY EVENING

Guardian Understands that a Grant of \$600 has Been Made.

TO THE LIEUT. GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL

The Memorial of the undersigned respectfully sheweth:

That they come before you on behalf of the Committee which was appointed to provide for the erection of a Monument, commemorative of the action of those who lately in South Africa so nobly ventured and in some instances, gave their lives in behalf of their Country's cause.

In all times and in all lands it has been deemed a sacred duty to recognize noble deeds and to ensure that the remembrance of them shall be preserved as an incentive for emulation on the part of succeeding generations. No people failing to realize this need can hope to prosper, for it is only in proportion as men's souls are dominated by high ideals that they can attain to aught that is great or glorious. Sad, indeed, is it when men are so sunk in sordid commercialism that their hearts are not responsive to this noble instinct of humanity.

Even now we can appreciate somewhat of the historic importance of our action in sending our sons to assist on the battlefield, the solidarity of the Empire. Still more readily should we realize the debt of gratitude we owe those of our men who served in the South African Campaign. We gave our honor to their keeping and they not only retained it unsullied, but have caused it to shine with new lustre. It is only necessary to imagine what would have been our feelings had they tarnished our laurels to appreciate the measure of our obligation. Surely then it is fitting that as a Province we shall erect some lasting memorial that will attest to our recognition, both of the importance of the incident and the conduct of our troops.

The educative influence that such records possess is not easily overestimated. Think you that the statues and columns which stand in the public places of England, the monuments which grace that great National Mausoleum, Westminster Abbey, have not had an influence upon the souls of Englishmen, not measurable in pounds, shillings and pence? This is a new country, but we are beginning to realize that we are participating in the birth of a nation, and should seek a deeper appreciation of all that tends to develop national character.

Impressed by such ideas a number of our citizens have subscribed \$2400 towards the erection of a monument to be placed in front of the Provincial Building. From such information as we have been able to secure and from a careful examination of the plans submitted to us, we have reached the conclusion that it would not be possible to erect a suitable one—one that would not be an eye-sore, for a less sum than from three thousand five hundred to four thousand dollars.

We therefore come to you, as custodians of the public purse and public honor, asking that you shall give to this movement your official recognition and adequate financial support. A grant of one thousand dollars from you would put us in possession of funds sufficient to warrant the work being at once proceeded with. This is less than one cent per head of our population, surely not an amount that any person would grudge for such a purpose. Submitting the matter to your consideration, confidently expecting a favorable response, your memorialists, as in duty bound, will ever pray.

ANNUAL MEETING P. E. I. HOSPITAL

239 Patients Admitted to the Institution During the Year

A BALANCE NOW ON HAND OF \$286.78

The Expense of Management has Greatly Increased. The Liberal Response Commented Upon. An Ice House to be Erected and the Phoebe Brecken Home to be Made into a Hospital for Contagious Diseases.

The annual meeting of the Prince Edward Island Hospital was held last night in the parlors of the Y. M. C. A. The attendance was large and representative.

After the reading of the annual report of the trustees coupled with the reports of the Treasurer and Ladies' Aid Society Mr. Chas. Palmer President of the Board of Trustees moved their adoption. In doing so he referred to the generous response toward the expense of the institution. He also paid a high tribute to the work of the Ladies' Aid Society.

Supt. Sharpe after congratulating the Board upon the excellent showing trusted that the liberal support given the institution in the past would be extended in the future. He seconded the motion.

Messrs. L.L. Bear and J.E.B. McCreedy, also expressed themselves as pleased with the year's record.

The President then intimated that according to the rules of the institution, Dr. Johnson and H. J. Cundall would retire and it would be necessary to elect two gentlemen to fill their places. After paying a tribute to Hon. A. B. McKenzie he reminded the meeting that it would also be necessary to elect his successor.

Mr. L. L. Bear in dealing with the revenue of the Hospital contended that as in other places the Government should make a grant.

The President said that the Hospital was not even receiving a grant from the City of Charlottetown.

Mr. G. D. Longworth, after congratulating the Board upon the season's work thought that a contagious ward should be established. In this venture the Government must certainly aid. He impressed upon the Board the importance of building an ice house. He was also pleased to note that the grounds of the hospital were being beautified. He then moved a vote of thanks to the ladies which was seconded by Dr. Johnson. The election of Trustees resulted as follows:

During the meeting the expenditure of over \$900 for coal was considered too much. During the present summer the system will be looked into with a view of lessening the coal consumption.

REPORT OF LADIES' AID SOCIETY.

The Annual Meeting of the Ladies' Aid Society of the P. E. I. Hospital was held on October 2nd, 1900, and the following officers were elected for the year:—

President, Mrs. Geo. Bremner; Vice-Presidents, Mrs. Thos. Dodd, Miss Lowden Mrs. A. Lord, Mrs. A. Down, Mrs. James McLeod, Mrs. J. E. B. McCreedy, Mrs. Geo. Hodgson, Mrs. Whiston; Secretary, Treasurer, Mrs. G. A. Sharp. At a subsequent meeting Miss P. L. Taylor was elected Assistant Secretary-Treasurer.

The secretaries have endeavored as far as possible to reach all the country districts through correspondence and although a few have not yet responded to the call, many have promptly forwarded generous collections, and we take pleasure in stating that there has been an increase over previous years.

At a meeting held early in the year a constitution was asked to be framed for the future government of the Society, and one was accordingly drafted and adopted by a unanimous vote.

A Standing Committee of five members was appointed to visit the Hospital monthly, the object being to make enquiries as to what the needs are, and to furnish relief for the same to the amount of a sum stated by the Society; if a larger sum is required it will be reported to the Society for consideration.

The date of our annual meeting has been changed from September to May with a view of having it correspond with that of the Board of Trustees, consequently we have only the proceedings of seven months to report.

The balance to the credit of the Society at the beginning of the term amounted to \$46.45.

At a concert given in aid of the Hospital by Professor Watts in the Methodist Church, in November last, the net proceeds were \$147.00.

Receipts from members for annual dues \$10.50, and the proceeds from the sale of tickets and candy in connection with a

lecture given by the Rev. Mr. Fullerton in February, amounted to \$101.30; making the total receipts from all sources \$253.80.

The amount required to purchase cork carpeting for the purpose of lessening the noise in the Hospital has been donated by friends as follows:—\$16.25 from Prowse Bros. for the upper corridors; \$12.50 from Mrs. S. E. Perkins; \$12.50 from a friend, and \$15.50 from Mrs. F. P. Taylor for second hall and corridor.
