The Stanley arrived at Georgetown from Picton yesterday morning at 6 o'clock and the McIntyre reached Picton at 6 o'clock. The McIntyre left Picton at 1 o'clock and the Stanley left Georgetown at the same time. The Stanley brought over a full cargo and had eighteen passengers.

The chairman of the street committee of Montserrat cannot be as wide awake as Chairman Prowse in this city, judging from the following, which is clipped from the Montserrat Transcript of the 23rd inst.:—"The side streets are in a terrible condition at the present time. The side-walks are covered with a mass of mud, and in places where the catch-basins have not been cleared, the streets are flooded. At the corner of Queen and Archibald Streets, one of the worst spots exists, the entire road being flooded."

A very enthusiastic meeting was held at Hampton, on the 16th inst. 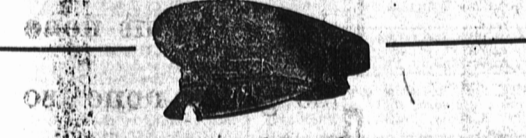
