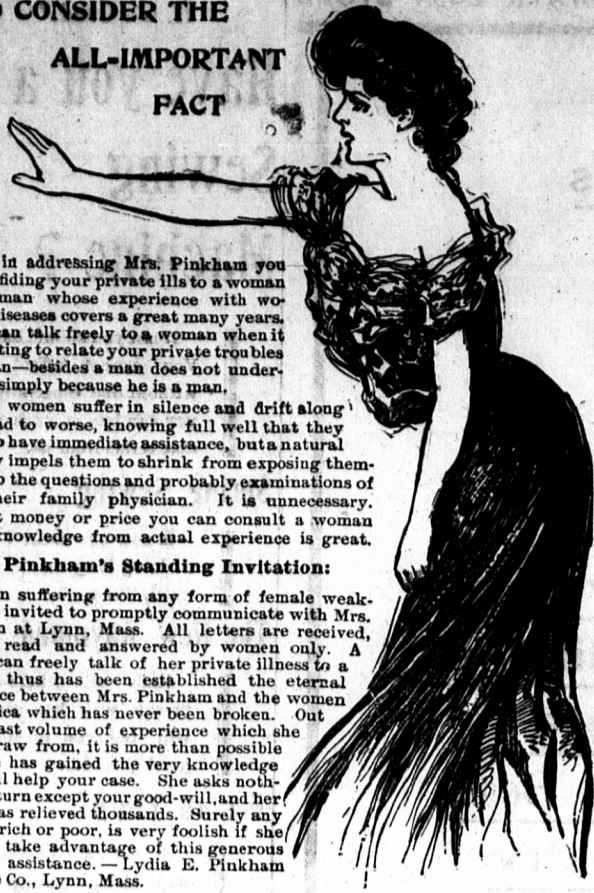

IMPOSING WELCOME TO BISHOP McDONALD

threatening aspect, but the people of Naples were entirely unconcerned.

"Naples is left by train for Monte Casino, the home of the Benedictines, at whose monastery we stayed over night. The mountain is alive with the traditions and spirit of St. Benedict. It was here that the great monk early in the fifth century laid the foundations of the grand old order that has given to the church so many saints, popes and doctors. The library contains thousands of most interesting manuscripts, among them autograph letters of St. Thomas Aquinas and the great Pope Hildebrand.

"The next evening we were in Rome," said the bishop. "It was a night as we were entering, but as the great lights of the city flashed through our car windows what striking associations of ancient classical and religious Rome arose in our minds! 'Ave Roma Immortalis' was the unconscious salute in all hearts, and on all lips. Weeks here passed rapidly—in visiting the sights of historical and Christian Rome. Magnificent churches arise on every side and fill one with admiration for their grandeur, antiquity and beauty. Beyond their all, as indeed surpassing all church structures in the world, stands on the Vatican hill, the great basilica of St. Peter's. Five, six, even ten visits seem well spent but insufficient to take in the full magnificence of this great mother of the churches. Our visit to the Pope is something never to be forgotten. His Holiness has a charming presence, and kindness and paternity seemed living in his every movement. One cannot but feel awed in the presence of the supreme pontiff, but Pius X. was quick to put one at his ease. We saw him many times, and always with the same happy impression. On January 15th we left Rome for the east, taking steamer at Brindisi, visiting the island of Corfu, Patras, Corinth, Athens and Constantinople. Remaining there, three days we sailed to Smyrna, Salonica, to Beyrouth.

"Twenty days were spent in the Holy Land, visiting Galilee and Judaea. Then we went down to Egypt and after spending three days in Cairo and seeing the Pyramids, we returned by Alexandria to Brindisi and thence back to Rome. After another week spent pleasantly there we left on March 8th for a hurried trip through Western Europe and the British Isles.

"I was particularly pleased to visit that part of Ireland from which my father and mother came to St. John in 1847. I had the happiness to say mass and preach to the people in the same old church in which they were married. The visits to Cork, Dublin, London and Liverpool were necessarily short, for we were booked to sail by the Virginian on April 6. "Our first care on our last day ashore was to say mass in the pro-cathedral of Liverpool. "At four in the afternoon we started for Prince's Landing Stage, where our good ship lay awaiting us at the wharf. It seemed long since we saw anything so graceful and attractive as the Virginian—now appeared to us. Just from the hands of the builders, and preparing to start on her maiden voyage, of her own merits she was a beautiful sight, but our associations of her—she was to bring us home, and to all that is connected with that sweetest of words—'reunited' to add ten-fold to her grace and beauty. She is a sister ship to the Victorian, which sailed for St. John two weeks before, but is said to be even more powerful. They are the largest and speediest ships that have yet crossed the ocean in any Canadian line, and the first ocean turbine ships that have crossed the Atlantic. The experiment for the Virginian at least is a perfect success. We sailed at the goodly speed of nearly sixteen knots an hour and with such perfect ease that one was not conscious generally of moving at all. There is an absolute absence of that vibration that is so noticeable and, indeed, disconcerting in other fast-sailing ships. She is provided with every means of comfort for passengers of all classes and officers and men are obliging and courteous. The staterooms are well ventilated and lighted, neat and commodious. Thus our voyage was very pleasant, and time flew as rapidly as even one could wish who was coming home after an extended visit to far distant lands and peoples."
